We kindly request you to submit your Proposal for “CLEANUP OF THE SEABED WITHIN THE KARABURUNI-SAZANI MARINE PROTECTED AREA (KS – MPA)”.

With this assignment the project intends to extend the actual recycling activities undertaken in the terrestrial and coastline, providing this way better standards and improvements of the waste management system in Vlorë, including not only recycling of used oil and plastics, their separation, collection, treatment and disposal, but also collection and disposal of marine debris and particular marine litter, plastic and ghost nets.

In addition, the main benefits from these activities relate to building up municipal and local capacities in coping with similar situation, but particularly in improving waste management service in touristic area, and providing better tourism standards.

Marine litter presents a threat to marine environment and can cause the deterioration of water quality. Albanian tourist sites are found to be prone to both historical and newly created marine litter, resulting from land based activities and ship activities.

The overall development objective to this project is to improve the health of ecosystems and water quality in the Albanian waterfront tourist sites. The fulfillment of this objective will be achieved through a low cost and high impact volunteer mechanism, which will allow a significant reduction of marine litter. To this end, a network of volunteer divers will enable the collection and disposal of marine litter in the targeted sites.

A priority list of areas is already set in place, targeting highly frequented sites from north to south Albania. Target sites will be cleared of solid debris up to 200 m distance from the shore. The project, through its network of volunteers aims to raise public awareness and encourage community inclusion in keeping shores free of solid waste.

The second step to the project concerns the consignment of all collected waste to local government entities. The process will be carried on based on a mutual understanding agreement signed by all stakeholders, and will be monitored by the project, to enable data collection on waste disposal in designated landfills.

The main scope of work will be:

The main objective of the project is to improve the quality of the seawater and the beaches within the KS MPA boundaries. Moreover, a cleanup project has the potential to make the problem visible, and helps people become aware of the problem in general. In the future, it would also allow adopting and introducing spin-off technology solutions to facilitate marine water cleanup as well as intercept wastes in rivers before it reaches the sea.



Description of Requirements

Context of the Requirement	<p>UNDP has supported the Albanian Government to improve the coverage and management effectiveness of Albania's network of marine and coastal protected areas as an essential complement to its network of terrestrial protected areas, and, contributes to Albania's obligations under different UN Conventions and the EU accession process. Significant achievements were made in the Vlora region by catalyzing the involvement of stakeholders, supporting the establishment of a clear institutional and legal framework for MCPA designation and management. The current project is focused on developing a scientifically designed, stakeholder supported network of MCPAs to effectively protect 30% of representative marine and coastal habitats of Albania.</p> <p>MPAs are both important to protect our marine wildlife, and vital for our economy. The Karaburun – Sazani Marine Protected Area (KS MPA) Management Plan highlights pollution as one of the main threat for the MPA itself. This represents a threat towards water quality, marine life (<i>Posidonia</i> meadows, <i>coralligenous</i> communities, fish species, algae, marine invertebrates, etc.), but also human health. Pollution can come from the coast in a form of waste and wastewater and from the sea in a form of discharges and accidental oil spills. Threat from pollution is usually linked to surrounding areas and cannot be regulated without good inter-sectoral cooperation, especially on local and regional levels.</p> <p>When considering the pollution from the coast, one of the key problems in the area is solid waste, which is largely generated from tourist and marine transport activities in the region, but also from local communities (both construction and municipal waste). As for wastewaters, it represents a major threat due to poor connection to sewage system and very few treatment plants. The litter comes from different sources: unpurified water trawling, storms, river waters, debris on the shore, abandoned fishing gear, etc. According to UNEP, 70% rests on the seabed, another 15% remains in the water column, and the rest floats on the sea surface and ends up on beaches, whereas, UN Environment, defines any persistent, manufactured or processed solid material, discarded, disposed or abandoned in the marine and coastal environment is considered marine litter; it causes a wide spectrum of environmental, economic, safety and health impacts, but it has especially perturbing effects on marine environment and represents a substantial cause of water quality deterioration.</p> <p>What the main risks are?</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Plastic, as very significant waste stream, is responsible for loss of aquatic life, habitat damage and biodiversity risk. Over time, in a process called photo-degradation, UV radiation causes large plastic objects to fragment into ever smaller pieces. Not only are smaller pieces harder to extract, but they are also more harmful than large objects due to bioavailability to the small creatures that form the base
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	<p>of the marine food web. Small pieces are being consumed by fish and birds, and may thereby transport toxic persistent chemicals into the food chain (which includes humans). Thus, marine litter is often the cause of habitat destruction, and can evoke smothering of the seabed, entangled litter on coral reefs and deposition on sea grass beds; Therefore, by cleaning up the rubbish (including plastics) from seabed, it also prevents the creation of more micro-plastics.</p> <p>- Another serious risk comes from the so-called “ghost nets”. These are nets and other fishing gear which are lost, abandoned or discarded into the sea. They are “silent killers” carried by the currents, wrapping themselves around reefs and claiming the lives of millions of marine creatures great and small, from sponges and tiny crustaceans to dolphins and sharks, therefore continuing doing what they were designed to do: catch fish. Mostly made of strong plastic such as nylon, these ghost nets don’t easily decompose.</p> <p>Objectives:</p> <p>The main objective of the project is to improve the quality of the seawater and the beaches within the KS MPA boundaries.</p> <p>Moreover, a cleanup project has the potential to make the problem visible, and helps people become aware of the problem in general, raise awareness among local communities, tourists, public and private entities directly interested in waterfront usage and waste management.</p>

Title to any equipment and supplies that may be furnished by UNDP shall rest with UNDP and any such equipment shall be returned to UNDP at the conclusion of this Contract or when no longer needed by the Contractor. Such equipment, when returned to UNDP, shall be in the same condition as when delivered to the Contractor, subject to normal wear and tear. The Contractor shall be liable to compensate UNDP for equipment determined to be damaged or degraded beyond normal wear and tear.

11.0 COPYRIGHT, PATENTS AND OTHER PROPRIETARY RIGHTS:

- 11.1** Except as is otherwise expressly provided in writing in the Contract, the UNDP shall be entitled to all intellectual property and other proprietary rights including, but not limited to, patents, copyrights, and trademarks, with regard to products, processes, inventions, ideas, know-how, or documents and other materials which the Contractor has developed for the UNDP under the Contract and which bear a direct relation to or are produced or prepared or collected in consequence of, or during the course of, the performance of the Contract, and the Contractor acknowledges and agrees that such products, documents and other materials constitute works made for hire for the UNDP.
- 11.2** To the extent that any such intellectual property or other proprietary rights consist of any intellectual property or other proprietary rights of the Contractor: (i) that pre-existed the performance by the Contractor of its obligations under the Contract, or (ii) that the Contractor may develop or acquire, or may have developed or acquired, independently of the performance of its obligations under the Contract, the UNDP does not and shall not claim any ownership interest thereto, and the Contractor

grants to the UNDP a perpetual license to use such intellectual property or other proprietary right solely for the purposes of and in accordance with the requirements of the Contract.

11.3 At the request of the UNDP; the Contractor shall take all necessary steps, execute all necessary documents and generally assist in securing such proprietary rights and transferring or licensing them to the UNDP in compliance with the requirements of the applicable law and of the Contract.

11.4 Subject to the foregoing provisions, all maps, drawings, photographs, mosaics, plans, reports, estimates, recommendations, documents, and all other data compiled by or received by the Contractor under the Contract shall be the property of the UNDP, shall be made available for use or inspection by the UNDP at reasonable times and in reasonable places, shall be treated as confidential, and shall be delivered only to UNDP authorized officials on completion of work under the Contract.

12.0 USE OF NAME, EMBLEM OR OFFICIAL SEAL OF UNDP OR THE UNITED NATIONS:

The Contractor shall not advertise or otherwise make public the fact that it is a Contractor with UNDP, nor shall the Contractor, in any manner whatsoever use the name, emblem or official seal of UNDP or THE United Nations, or any abbreviation of the name of UNDP or United Nations in connection with its business or otherwise.

13.0 CONFIDENTIAL NATURE OF DOCUMENTS AND INFORMATION:

Information and data that is considered proprietary by either Party and that is delivered or disclosed by one Party ("Discloser") to the other Party ("Recipient") during the course of performance of the Contract, and that is designated as confidential ("Information"), shall be held in confidence by that Party and shall be handled as follows:

13.1 The recipient ("Recipient") of such information shall:

13.1.1 use the same care and discretion to avoid disclosure, publication or dissemination of the Discloser's Information as it uses with its own similar information that it does not wish to disclose, publish or disseminate; and,

13.1.2 use the Discloser's Information solely for the purpose for which it was disclosed.

13.2 Provided that the Recipient has a written agreement with the following persons or entities requiring them to treat the Information confidential in accordance with the Contract and this Article 13, the Recipient may disclose Information to:

13.2.1 any other party with the Discloser's prior written consent; and,

13.2.2 the Recipient's employees, officials, representatives and agents who have a need to know such Information for purposes of performing obligations under the Contract, and employees officials, representatives and agents of any legal entity that it controls controls it, or with which it is under common control, who have a need to know such Information for purposes of performing obligations under the Contract, provided that, for these purposes a controlled legal entity means:

13.2.2.1 a corporate entity in which the Party owns or otherwise controls, whether directly or indirectly, over fifty percent (50%) of voting shares thereof; or,

13.2.2.2 any entity over which the Party exercises effective managerial control; or,

13.2.2.3 for the UNDP, an affiliated Fund such as UNCDF, UNIFEM and UNV.

13.3 The Contractor may disclose Information to the extent required by law, provided that, subject to and without any waiver of the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, the Contractor will give the UNDP sufficient prior notice of a request for the disclosure of Information in order to allow the

UNDP to have a reasonable opportunity to take protective measures or such other action as may be appropriate before any such disclosure is made.

- 13.4 The UNDP may disclose Information to the extent as required pursuant to the Charter of the UN, resolutions or regulations of the General Assembly, or rules promulgated by the Secretary-General.
- 13.5 The Recipient shall not be precluded from disclosing Information that is obtained by the Recipient from a third party without restriction, is disclosed by the Discloser to a third party without any obligation of confidentiality, is previously known by the Recipient, or at any time is developed by the Recipient completely independently of any disclosures hereunder.
- 13.6 These obligations and restrictions of confidentiality shall be effective during the term of the Contract, including any extension thereof, and, unless otherwise provided in the Contract, shall remain effective following any termination of the Contract.

14.0 FORCE MAJEURE; OTHER CHANGES IN CONDITIONS

- 14.1 In the event of and as soon as possible after the occurrence of any cause constituting force majeure, the Contractor shall give notice and full particulars in writing to the UNDP, of such occurrence or change if the Contractor is thereby rendered unable, wholly or in part, to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract. The Contractor shall also notify the UNDP of any other changes in conditions or the occurrence of any event that interferes or threatens to interfere with its performance of this Contract. On receipt of the notice required under this Article, the UNDP shall take such action as, in its sole discretion; it considers to be appropriate or necessary in the circumstances, including the granting to the Contractor of a reasonable extension of time in which to perform its obligations under this Contract.
- 14.2 If the Contractor is rendered permanently unable, wholly, or in part, by reason of force majeure to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract, the UNDP shall have the right to suspend or terminate this Contract on the same terms and conditions as are provided for in Article 15, "Termination", except that the period of notice shall be seven (7) days instead of thirty (30) days.
- 14.3 Force majeure as used in this Article means acts of God, war (whether declared or not), invasion, revolution, insurrection, or other acts of a similar nature or force.
- 14.4 The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that, with respect to any obligations under the Contract that the Contractor must perform in or for any areas in which the UNDP is engaged in, preparing to engage in, or disengaging from any peacekeeping, humanitarian or similar operations, any delays or failure to perform such obligations arising from or relating to harsh conditions within such areas or to any incidents of civil unrest occurring in such areas shall not, in and of itself, constitute force majeure under the Contract..

15.0 TERMINATION

- 15.1 Either party may terminate this Contract for cause, in whole or in part, upon thirty (30) days notice, in writing, to the other party. The initiation of arbitral proceedings in accordance with Article 16.2 ("Arbitration"), below, shall not be deemed a termination of this Contract.
- 15.2 UNDP reserves the right to terminate without cause this Contract at any time upon 15 days prior written notice to the Contractor, in which case UNDP shall reimburse the Contractor for all reasonable costs incurred by the Contractor prior to receipt of the notice of termination.
- 15.3 In the event of any termination by UNDP under this Article, no payment shall be due from UNDP to the Contractor except for work and services satisfactorily performed in conformity with the express terms of this Contract.

- 15.4** Should the Contractor be adjudged bankrupt, or be liquidated or become insolvent, or should the Contractor make an assignment for the benefit of its creditors, or should a Receiver be appointed on account of the insolvency of the Contractor, the UNDP may, without prejudice to any other right or remedy it may have under the terms of these conditions, terminate this Contract forthwith. The Contractor shall immediately inform the UNDP of the occurrence of any of the above events.

16.0 SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

- 16.1 Amicable Settlement:** The Parties shall use their best efforts to settle amicably any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of this Contract or the breach, termination or invalidity thereof. Where the parties wish to seek such an amicable settlement through conciliation, the conciliation shall take place in accordance with the UNCITRAL Conciliation Rules then obtaining, or according to such other procedure as may be agreed between the parties.
- 16.2 Arbitration:** Any dispute, controversy, or claim between the Parties arising out of the Contract or the breach, termination, or invalidity thereof, unless settled amicably under Article 16.1, above, within sixty (60) days after receipt by one Party of the other Party's written request for such amicable settlement, shall be referred by either Party to arbitration in accordance with the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules then obtaining. The decisions of the arbitral tribunal shall be based on general principles of international commercial law. For all evidentiary questions, the arbitral tribunal shall be guided by the Supplementary Rules Governing the Presentation and Reception of Evidence in International Commercial Arbitration of the International Bar Association, 28 May 1983 edition. The arbitral tribunal shall be empowered to order the return or destruction of goods or any property, whether tangible or intangible, or of any confidential information provided under the Contract, order the termination of the Contract, or order that any other protective measures be taken with respect to the goods, services or any other property, whether tangible or intangible, or of any confidential information provided under the Contract, as appropriate, all in accordance with the authority of the arbitral tribunal pursuant to Article 26 ("Interim Measures of Protection") and Article 32 ("Form and Effect of the Award") of the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules. The arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award punitive damages. In addition, unless otherwise expressly provided in the Contract, the arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award interest in excess of the London Inter-Bank Offered Rate ("LIBOR") then prevailing, and any such interest shall be simple interest only. The Parties shall be bound by any arbitration award rendered as a result of such arbitration as the final adjudication of any such dispute, controversy, or claim.

17.0 PRIVILEGES AND IMMUNITIES:

Nothing in or relating to this Contract shall be deemed a waiver, express or implied, of any of the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs.

18.0 TAX EXEMPTION

- 18.1** Section 7 of the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations provides, inter alia that the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs, is exempt from all direct taxes, except charges for public utility services, and is exempt from customs duties and charges of a similar nature in respect of articles imported or exported for its official use. In the event any governmental authority refuses to recognize the United Nations exemption from such taxes, duties or charges, the Contractor shall immediately consult with the UNDP to determine a mutually acceptable procedure.
- 18.2** Accordingly, the Contractor authorizes UNDP to deduct from the Contractor's invoice any amount representing such taxes, duties or charges, unless the Contractor has consulted with the UNDP before the payment thereof and the UNDP has, in each instance, specifically authorized the Contractor to pay such taxes, duties or charges under protest. In that event, the Contractor shall provide the UNDP with written evidence that payment of such taxes, duties or charges has been made and appropriately authorized.

19.0 CHILD LABOUR

- 19.1** The Contractor represents and warrants that neither it, nor any of its suppliers is engaged in any practice inconsistent with the rights set forth in the Convention on the Rights of the Child, including Article 32 thereof, which, inter alia, requires that a child shall be protected from performing any work that is likely to be hazardous or to interfere with the child's education, or to be harmful to the child's health or physical mental, spiritual, moral or social development.
- 19.2** Any breach of this representation and warranty shall entitle UNDP to terminate this Contract immediately upon notice to the Contractor, at no cost to UNDP.

20.0 MINES:

- 20.1** The Contractor represents and warrants that neither it nor any of its suppliers is actively and directly engaged in patent activities, development, assembly, production, trade or manufacture of mines or in such activities in respect of components primarily utilized in the manufacture of Mines. The term "Mines" means those devices defined in Article 2, Paragraphs 1, 4 and 5 of Protocol II annexed to the Convention on Prohibitions and Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects of 1980.
- 20.2** Any breach of this representation and warranty shall entitle UNDP to terminate this Contract immediately upon notice to the Contractor, without any liability for termination charges or any other liability of any kind of UNDP.

21.0 OBSERVANCE OF THE LAW:

The Contractor shall comply with all laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations bearing upon the performance of its obligations under the terms of this Contract.

22.0 SEXUAL EXPLOITATION:

- 22.1** The Contractor shall take all appropriate measures to prevent sexual exploitation or abuse of anyone by it or by any of its employees or any other persons who may be engaged by the Contractor to perform any services under the Contract. For these purposes, sexual activity with any person less than eighteen years of age, regardless of any laws relating to consent, shall constitute the sexual exploitation and abuse of such person. In addition, the Contractor shall refrain from, and shall take all appropriate measures to prohibit its employees or other persons engaged by it from, exchanging any money, goods, services, offers of employment or other things of value, for sexual favors or activities, or from engaging in any sexual activities that are exploitive or degrading to any person. The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that the provisions hereof constitute an essential term of the Contract and that any breach of this representation and warranty shall entitle UNDP to terminate the Contract immediately upon notice to the Contractor, without any liability for termination charges or any other liability of any kind.
- 22.2** The UNDP shall not apply the foregoing standard relating to age in any case in which the Contractor's personnel or any other person who may be engaged by the Contractor to perform any services under the Contract is married to the person less than the age of eighteen years with whom sexual activity has occurred and in which such marriage is recognized as valid under the laws of the country of citizenship of such Contractor's personnel or such other person who may be engaged by the Contractor to perform any services under the Contract.

23.0 AUTHORITY TO MODIFY:

Pursuant to the Financial Regulations and Rules of UNDP, only the UNDP Authorized Official possesses the authority to agree on behalf of UNDP to any modification of or change in this Contract, to a waiver of any of its provisions or to any additional contractual relationship of any kind with the Contractor. Accordingly, no modification or change in this Contract shall be valid and enforceable against UNDP unless provided by an amendment to this Contract signed by the Contractor and jointly by the UNDP Authorized Official.

Terms of Reference

CLEANUP OF THE SEABED WITHIN THE KARABURUNI-SAZANI MARINE PROTECTED AREA

Background:

UNDP has supported the Albanian Government to improve the coverage and management effectiveness of Albania's network of marine and coastal protected areas (MCPAs) as an essential complement to its network of terrestrial protected areas and contribute to Albania's obligations under different UN Conventions and the EU accession process. Significant achievements were made in the Vlora region by catalyzing the involvement of stakeholders and by supporting the establishment of a clear institutional and legal framework for MCPA designation and management. However, multiple stages of development are needed before an Albanian ecologically representative MCPA network is fully realized and can provide coastal communities with sustained benefits from the marine and coastal environment.

MPAs are both important to protect our marine wildlife, and vital for our economy. The Karaburun – Sazani Marine Protected Area (KS MPA) Management Plan highlights pollution as one of the main threat for the MPA itself. This represents a threat towards water quality, marine life (*Posidonia* meadows, *coralligenous* communities, fish species, algae, marine invertebrates, etc.), but also human health. Pollution can come from the coast in a form of waste and wastewater and from the sea in a form of discharges and accidental oil spills. Threat from pollution is usually linked to surrounding areas and cannot be regulated without good inter-sectoral cooperation, especially on local and regional levels.

When considering the pollution from the coast, one of the key problems in the area is solid waste, which is largely generated from tourist and marine transport activities in the region, but also from local communities (both construction and municipal waste). As for wastewaters, it represents a major threat due to poor connection to sewage system and very few treatment plants. The litter comes from different sources: unpurified water trawling, storms, river waters, debris on the shore, abandoned fishing gear, etc. According to UNEP, 70% rests on the seabed, another 15% remains in the water column, and the rest floats on the sea surface and ends up on beaches.

What the main risks are?

- Plastic, as very significant waste stream, is responsible for loss of aquatic life, habitat damage and biodiversity risk. Over time, in a process called photo-degradation, UV radiation causes large plastic objects to fragment into ever smaller pieces. Not only are smaller pieces harder to extract, but they are also more harmful than large objects due to bioavailability to the small creatures that form the base of the marine food web. Small pieces are being consumed by fish and birds, and may thereby transport toxic persistent chemicals into the food chain (which includes humans). Therefore, by cleaning up the rubbish (including plastics) from seabed, it also prevents the creation of more micro-plastics.
- Another serious risk comes from the so-called "ghost nets". These are nets and other

fishing gear which are lost, abandoned or discarded into the sea. They are “silent killers” carried by the currents, wrapping themselves around reefs and claiming the lives of millions of marine creatures great and small, from sponges and tiny crustaceans to dolphins and sharks, therefore continuing doing what they were designed to do: catch fish. Mostly made of strong plastic such as nylon, these ghost nets don’t easily decompose.

The proposal intends to be a first step toward the long term goal of guaranteeing marine litter-free tourist sites (“blue flag beaches”)



Highly frequented sites are especially prone to floating marine litter such as plastic, glass or other solid materials, mainly caused by littering in urban coastal areas as well as tourist activities.

Vlora Local government entities are the responsible bodies for on shore and off shore waste management, to ensure clean and secure beaches for their communities, as well as national and international tourists; they are the main beneficiary of this project, and will further encourage the engagement of the local community, private entities operating beach stations and tourists in maintaining litter-free shores, and informing and promoting safe tourism among domestic and foreign tourists.

Goal:

The goal of this project is two-folded: remove harmful waste from nature, and raise citizen awareness so that the garbage ends up in the proper container and not the sea.

Objectives:

The main objective of the project is to improve the quality of the seawater and the beaches within the KS MPA boundaries. Moreover, a cleanup project has the potential to make the problem visible, and helps people become aware of the problem in general. In the future, it would also allow adopting and introducing spin-off technology solutions to facilitate marine water cleanup as well as intercept wastes in rivers before it reaches the sea.

Technical details

The cleanup activity will be performed up to a maximum depth of 20 meters, which is approximately 200 meters far from the shore.

The Offeror has to consider this detail when setting the location of polluted spots in the MPA map.

Timing

The process is expected to be performed in two interventions. One intervention will be performed in September - October 2018.

Equipment Requirements

The equipment needed for the successful implementation of this project is as follow:

- SCUBA diving equipment (full range, including the compressor)
- Underwater camera (fully equipped)
- Boat with floating crane of 1 ton lifting capacity
- Transport nets (similar to fishing nets)
- Underwater air balloons

Tasks and responsibilities

The successful Offeror will be responsible for the accomplishment of the following tasks:

- Conduction of a rapid study on the location of the polluted spots with rubbish of any kind. This will be indicated by positioning the relevant marks on the MPA map (and the respective coordinates), associated by underwater photos.
- Preparation of a visual presentation of the water currents within the MPA, by indicating on the MPA map the currents movement and direction.
- Preparation of a formal notification and submission to the relevant authorities (border police, port authority and municipality), prior to commencing the implementation of the cleanup activity. The notification should include, but not limited to, the following:
 - o the scope of the activity,
 - o the area of intervention,
 - o the gear to be used,
 - o the timetable of the entire activity implementation period,
 - o the assistance required by each authority (including disposal guidance provided by the municipality)
- Ensure that all needful coordination and collaboration among the concerned institutions takes place for the proper implementation of site operating the endorsement of project results i.e. the contracted entity must attest for closely collaboration with state entities, including central and local government institutions, regional and local hospitals (care and attention to the health and security of diver operations, ambulances and necessary equipment and other cardiovascular first aid assistance, Border State Police, Albanian Coast Guard, and municipal authorities for the proper disposal of collected debris
- Enclosing the intervention area at the sea surface and deployment of a buoy in order to make the area visible.
- Implementing the cleanup process.

Deliverables

The successful Offeror is expected to deliver the following services:

- Preparation of the work-plan, determination of the location of polluted spots with rubbish of any kind and acquirement of the respective permits from relevant authorities.
- Removal and appropriate disposal of all rubbish from the seabed, accompanied by the set of “before and after” underwater and surface photo and video shootings, documenting the situation and the cleanup process.
- Narrative report for the completion of the work and photo or video of the cleaning process

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
