B. PROJECT DESCRIPTION OR BACKGROUND

As the UN's development agency, UNDP helps countries to achieve sustainable development by eradicating poverty in all its forms and dimensions, accelerating structural transformations for sustainable development, and building resilience to crises and shocks. The project "Deforestation-Free Commodities – Roadmaps for Moving from Commitment to Action" is being managed through UNDP's Regional Hub in Panama, established by UNDP's Regional Bureau for Latin America and the Caribbean in 2008 to bring policy and advisory support to the 26 countries of the region.

The Panama regional hub is focused on strengthening the capacities of the country offices, which in turn assist governments and communities in achieving the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. The Hub works around thematic and cross-cutting areas and includes dedicated support on Private Sector Solutions to development challenges. This initiative contributes to three of the Hub's priority areas: a) Fostering inclusive economic growth and productivity through value chains, employment and livelihoods; b) Supporting countries to sustainably manage natural resources and govern extractive industries; and c) Bringing countries together, in the region and beyond: South-South cooperation.

A new global initiative: C2A

“From Commitment to Action” (C2A) is a global flagship UNDP initiative aiming to support countries to accelerate a reduction in deforestation from agricultural commodities in key forest eco-regions of the world. This is achieved through supporting countries to set out their roadmaps for implementing deforestation-free commodity commitments, through multistakeholder dialogue at national level. C2A is being piloted in the Amazon eco-region in 2018, with participation by public sector, private sector and civil society stakeholders, as well as technical and financial partners, in three Amazon countries with high levels of agricultural commodity exports: Peru, Colombia and Ecuador (and potentially Brazil as well, to be confirmed). This pilot phase is funded through the United Nations Partnership for Action on Green Economy (PAGE), as well as UNDP (through the Climate and Forests and Green Commodities Programmes).

The expansion of commodity crop production has been a leading driver of deforestation in many of the world’s remaining major forests, causing a loss of valuable carbon sinks and other services important to society, like clean air and water, and livelihoods for forest-dependent peoples. Large forest-ecoregions under pressure include the Amazon Basin, Congo Basin forest, forests of Borneo (Kalimantan), Guinean forests in West Africa, and Gran Chaco Forest of South America. Many commitments have been made – both by governments and companies – to reduce deforestation resulting from the production of commodity crops, but progress in achieving the goals set out in these commitments has been slow and uneven.

One of the barriers to progress involves a lack of effective dialogue between the public and private sectors, as well as civil society, and technical and financial partners. Many multinational companies buying commodities like soy, beef, palm oil, coffee and cacao, as well as timber and wood products, have made commitments to sourcing only products cultivated without causing deforestation, and some trade agreements between nations include related goals. Private sector commitments include adherence to certification standards, investor policies, environmental regulations, and/or voluntary company commitments. In practice, however, systems are not always in place in-country to facilitate responsible sourcing. Buyer companies are increasingly seeing a need to engage more directly with governments and producers on these issues, as well as ongoing policy reform processes. Examples of issues for dialogue include reconciling and aligning national policy goals and laws affecting commodity production; mapping forests being converted for commodities; strengthened land use planning with stakeholders in high risk areas; cut-off dates after which forest clearance is not allowed; registries of land ownership and forest coverage, or reform of land tenure systems; satellite and on-ground monitoring, with enforcement measures; market access / legal penalties for non-compliance; traceability systems for company sourcing, and local purchasing.

Focus on Amazon Eco-region

The C2A initiative is starting in the Amazon, where production of commodities including soy, beef, palm, coffee and cocoa continues to contribute to forest loss and degradation. UNDP is providing a package of support services to participating countries, helping them move “From Commitment to Action”, through roadmaps articulating how the country will meet its commitments, facilitated through public-private sector engagement. This engagement will occur within a wider framework of intersectoral institutionalization, as well as dialogue between diverse stakeholders involved in processes related to land use change and forestry – including indigenous and local communities, farmers and agricultural associations, local government authorities, national and private financial institutions, national and multinational buying companies.

Phase 1, through the project on “Deforestation-Free Commodities – Roadmaps for Moving from Commitment to Action” will involve these steps:

1. **Take stock of existing commitments** by government and the private sector (domestic and international) to reduce deforestation from commodity production in the country

2. **Identify policies, actions or lack of action** by public or private sectors, that are enabling continued expansion of commodity “footprints” into primary and secondary rainforest
3. **Identify the initiatives already planned** and budgeted for, to meet the commitments, and highlight gaps where additional policies, actions and spending are required
4. **Produce a “roadmap”** outlining the key set of public and private sector actions through which the country will work towards its commitments, through multi-stakeholder dialogue
5. **Announce the roadmap** publicly through a United Nations forum or other global event (to be determined) with representation from the government, private sector, civil society and financial/technical partners

Countries wishing to take this process further may consider a Phase 2 – involving all the stakeholders in a longer-term process, ideally through an existing coalition or platform:

1. **Support an appropriate multi-stakeholder forum** where stakeholders can develop a detailed implementation plan for the roadmap, as well as timelines and indicators of progress
2. **Identify mechanisms for implementation, monitoring and report back** on an ongoing basis on the indicators for the implementation plan and fulfilment of the commitments.

Background on commitments

The **regional** backdrop to the C2A initiative is provided by the “Amazon Initiative: Sustainable Amazon by 2030” led by Ecuador and Colombia, aiming to bring together all the nine Amazon countries at the highest level to commit to shared goals of halting deforestation, restoring watersheds and protecting indigenous peoples. At sub-national level, 18 sub-national governments in South America (in Peru, Brazil, Colombia and Ecuador), are participating in the global Governors’ Climate and Forests Task Force, which works to advance jurisdiction-wide approaches to protect tropical forests, reduce emissions from deforestation and forest degradation, and promote realistic pathways to forest-maintaining rural development.

A number of **multinational companies** purchasing commodities produced in these Amazon countries are members of the Consumer Goods Forum and have committed to zero net deforestation by 2020 for palm oil, soy, beef, and paper and pulp supply chains. Many of these companies have also signed the New York Declaration on Forests, committing to eliminating deforestation from the production of agricultural commodities such as palm oil, soy, paper, and beef products by 2020.

The **Government of Peru** signed the Peru Joint Declaration of Intent (JDI) with the Governments of Norway and Germany in 2014, on “Cooperation on reducing greenhouse gas emissions from deforestation and forest degradation (REDD+) and promoting sustainable development in Peru”. The JDI is now in its second phase, with UNDP supporting Government on implementation. The declaration contains a specific commodity-related milestone, in line with Peru’s goals in the context of the UNFCCC and the Paris Agreement, including those of the National REDD+ Strategy and Nationally Determined Contribution. At sub-national level, 7 Amazon provinces of Peru are committed to the Rio Branco Declaration to reduce deforestation by 80% by 2020 – a commitment made by 38 sub-national governments participating in the Governors’ Climate and Forest Task Force: Piura, Amazonas, Loreto, San Martín, Huánuco, Ucayali and Madre de Dios.

The **Government of Colombia** has signed a Joint Declaration of Intent on “Cooperation on reducing greenhouse gas emissions from deforestation and forest degradation (REDD+) and promote sustainable development in Peru, with the Governments of Norway, UK and Germany. The JDI contains specific government commitments related to commodity production, in line with Colombia’s goals in the context of the UNFCCC and the Paris Agreement, including those of the National REDD+ Strategy and Nationally Determined Contribution. Additional funding has recently been made available for a new phase of work involving a commitment to freezing agricultural expansion into forested areas. At sub-national level, the Department of Caquetá in the

Colombian Amazon is committed to the Rio Branco Declaration to reduce deforestation by 80% by 2020 – a commitment made by 38 sub-national governments participating in the Governors’ Climate and Forest Task Force.

The **Government of Ecuador** has launched its national REDD+ Action Plan was launched in 2016 by the Ministry of Environment and institutionalized via ministerial decree. The country has completed its REDD+ readiness process, making it the second country worldwide to be eligible to seek REDD+ Result Based Payments. The REDD+ AP is designed to achieve targeted emission reductions from Land Use and Forestry, in line with Ecuador’s National Determined Contribution as part of the country’s commitment under the Paris Agreement. Ecuador has also made a commitment under the New York Declaration on Forests to cut natural forest loss in half by 2020 and strive to end it by 2030. The Free Trade Agreement signed in November 2016 between Ecuador and the European Union pays special attention to a series of activities, including: the mitigation of climate change, REDD+, the determination of the legal origin of forest products, voluntary forestry certification schemes and traceability of different forestry products and best practices for sustainable forest management. At sub-national level, the Province of Pastaza in the Ecuadorian Amazon is participating in the Governors’ Climate and Forest Task Force and has committed to the Rio Branco Declaration to reduce deforestation by 80% by 2020.

In taking forward this work, UNDP in the region will cooperate with all its partners, including, but not limited to: the Partnership for Action on Green Economy, the UN Forum on Forests, FAO and UN Environment (partners in implementing the UN-REDD Programme), the World Bank and Inter-American Development Bank (partners in the Forest Carbon Partnership Facility), the UN Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean, Meridian Institute and Climate Advisers (partners hosting the NYDF platform), the Tropical Forest Alliance, the Governors’ Climate and Forests Task Force, the secretariats of the Rio Conventions, the Global Environment Facility and partner agencies in the Good Growth Partnership, the Green Climate Fund, the Sustainable Development Solutions Network Amazonia, as well as a range of private sector and civil society partners.

See Annex 1 for examples of global commitments on reducing deforestation from commodities.

C. SCOPE OF WORK

The Regional Lead Consultant will be supervised by the Senior Advisor: Strategic Initiatives in the Green Commodities Programme of UNDP. Guidance for the consultant’s work will come from a steering committee hosted by the Panama regional hub of UNDP, and with representation from other key teams in UNDP, including the forest coordination group (GCP, REDD+, NYDF platform, GEF/GCF) and the NDC Support Programme. Members of the steering committee will have the opportunity to review draft documents and comment, and final sign-off on deliverables will be provided by the Head of the Green Commodities Programme in the Panama regional hub.

D. INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS

The Regional Lead Consultant will be supervised by the Senior Strategic Initiatives Advisor in the UNDP Green Commodities Programme.

Guidance to the consultant's work will be provided by a virtual steering committee for the project "Deforestation-Free Commodities – Roadmaps for Moving from Commitment to Action", involving UNDP staff from the Panama regional hub and from relevant teams, including GCP with the forest coordination group (REDD+, NYDF platform, GEF/GCF) and the NDC Support Programme.

The consultant will provide brief monthly report backs by email to the members of the steering committee. The members will have the opportunity to review important draft documents and comment.

Final sign-off on deliverables and payments to the consultant will be provided by the Head of the Green Commodities Programme

in the Panama Regional Hub.

Logistical support will be provided through the Green Commodities Programme office in the Panama Regional Hub, where necessary.

E. DURATION OF THE WORK

The Individual Contract is expected to require a commitment of approximately 65 days. The expected date of commencement is 1 November 2018 and expected completion date is 31 July 2019.

F. DUTY STATION

The Consultant will be home-based with mission travel. The Consultant will be given access to relevant information necessary for execution of the tasks under this assignment. The Consultant will be responsible for providing her/his own work station (i.e. laptop, internet, phone, scanner/printer, etc.) and must have access to a reliable internet connection.

Travel:

- International travel will be required - total number of days and timing to be determined;
- Any necessary missions must be approved in advance and in writing by the supervisor;
- The Advanced and Basic Security in the Field II courses must be successfully completed prior to commencement of travel;
- Individual Consultants are responsible for ensuring they have vaccinations/inoculations when travelling to certain countries, as designated by the UN Medical Director;
- Consultants are required to comply with the United Nations (UN) security directives set forth under <https://dss.un.org/dssweb/>;
- Consultants are responsible for obtaining any visas and security clearances needed in connection with travel with the necessary support from UNDP.

All related travel expenses will be paid separately through the project travel fund and will be reimbursed as per UNDP rules and regulations upon submission of an F-10 claim form and supporting documents. Costs for airfares, terminal expenses, and living allowances should not be included in financial proposal.

- Excellent oral and written English and Spanish are required.

Joint Declarations of Intent between countries, such as the multi-country Central African Forest Initiative joint Declaration, the Peru Joint Declaration of Intent on Cooperation on REDD+ and sustainable development with Norway and Germany, and the Colombia Joint Declaration of Intent on Cooperation on REDD+ and sustainable development with Norway, UK and Germany.

UNITED NATIONS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME GENERAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACTS FOR THE SERVICES OF INDIVIDUAL CONTRACTORS

1. LEGAL STATUS

The Individual contractor shall have the legal status of an independent contractor vis-à-vis the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), and shall not be regarded, for any purposes, as being either a "staff member" of UNDP, under the UN' Staff Regulations and Rules, or an "official" of UNDP, for purposes of the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations, adopted by the General Assembly of the United Nations on 13 February 1946.

Accordingly, nothing within or relating to the Individual Contract shall establish the relationship of employer and employee, or of principal and agent, between UNDP and the Individual contractor. The officials, representatives, employees or subcontractors of UNDP and of the Individual contractor, if any, shall not be considered in any respect as being the employees or agents of the other, and UNDP and the Individual contractor shall be solely responsible for all claims arising out of or relating to its engagement of such persons or entities.

2. STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

In General: The Individual contractor shall neither seek nor accept instructions from any authority external to UNDP in connection with the performance of its obligations under the Individual Contract. Should any authority external to UNDP seek to impose any instructions on the Individual Contract regarding the Individual contractor's performance under the Individual Contract, the Individual contractor shall promptly notify UNDP and shall provide all reasonable assistance required by UNDP. The Individual contractor shall not take any action in respect of its performance of the Individual Contract or otherwise related to its obligations under the Individual Contract that may adversely affect the interests of UNDP, and the Individual contractor shall perform its obligations under the Individual Contract with the fullest regard to the interests of UNDP. 3. TITLE RIGHTS, COPYRIGHTS, PATENTS AND OTHER PROPRIETARY RIGHTS

4. CONFIDENTIAL NATURE OF DOCUMENTS AND INFORMATION

Information and data that are considered proprietary by either UNDP or the Individual contractor or that are delivered or disclosed by one of them ("Discloser") to the other ("Recipient") during the course of performance of the Individual Contract, and that are designated as confidential ("Information"), shall be held in confidence and shall be handled as follows. The Recipient of such Information shall use the same care and discretion to avoid disclosure, publication or dissemination of the Discloser's Information as it uses with its own similar information that it does not wish to disclose, publish or disseminate, and the Recipient may otherwise use the Discloser's Information solely for the purpose for which it was disclosed.

The Recipient may disclose confidential Information to any other party with the Discloser's prior written consent, as well as to the Recipient's employees, officials, representatives and agents who have a need to know such confidential Information solely for purposes of performing obligations under the Individual Contract. Subject to and without any waiver of the privileges and immunities of UNDP, the Individual contractor may disclose Information to the extent required by law, *provided that* the Individual contractor will give UNDP sufficient prior notice of a request for the disclosure of Information in order to allow UNDP to have a reasonable opportunity to take protective measures or such other action as may be appropriate before any such disclosure is made. UNDP may disclose Information to the extent as required

pursuant to the Charter of the United Nations, resolutions or regulations of the General Assembly or its other governing bodies, or rules promulgated by the Secretary-General. The Recipient shall not be recluded from disclosing Information that is obtained by the Recipient from a third party without restriction, is disclosed by the Discloser to a third party without any obligation of confidentiality, is previously known by the Recipient, or at any time is developed by the Recipient completely independently of any disclosures hereunder. These obligations and restrictions of confidentiality shall be effective during the term of the Individual Contract, including any extension thereof, and, unless otherwise provided in the Individual Contract, shall remain effective following any termination of the Individual Contract.

5. TRAVEL, MEDICAL CLEARANCE AND SERVICE-INCURRED DEATH, INJURY OR ILLNESS

If the Individual contractor is required by UNDP to travel beyond commuting distance from the Individual contractor's usual place of residence, and upon prior written agreement, such travel shall be at the expense of UNDP. Such travel shall be at economy fare when by air.

UNDP may require the Individual contractor to submit a Statement of Good Health from a recognized physician prior to commencement of work in any offices or premises of UNDP or before engaging in any travel required by UNDP or connected with the performance of the Individual Contract. The Individual contractor shall provide such a Statement of Good Health as soon as practicable following such request, and prior to engaging in any such travel, and the Individual contractor warrants the accuracy of any such Statement, including, but not limited to, confirmation that the Individual contractor has been fully informed regarding the requirements for inoculations for the country or countries to which travel may be authorized.

In the event of the death, injury or illness of the Individual contractor which is attributable to the performance of services on behalf of UNDP under the terms of the Individual Contract while the Individual contractor is traveling at UNDP expense or is performing any services under the Individual Contract in any offices or premises of UNDP, the Individual contractor or the Individual contractor's dependents, as appropriate, shall be entitled to compensation equivalent to that provided

under the UNDP insurance policy, available upon request.

6. PROHIBITION ON ASSIGNMENT; MODIFICATIONS

The Individual contractor may not assign, delegate, transfer, pledge or make any other disposition of the Individual Contract, of any part thereof, or of any of the rights, claims or obligations under the Individual Contract except with the prior written authorization of UNDP, and any attempt to do so shall be null and void. The terms or conditions of any supplemental undertakings, licenses or other forms of Individual Contract concerning any goods or services to be provided under the Individual Contract shall not be valid and enforceable against UNDP nor in any way shall constitute an Individual Contract by UNDP thereto, unless any such undertakings, licenses or other forms of Individual Contract are the subject of a valid written undertaking by UNDP.

No modification or change in the Individual Contract shall be valid and enforceable against UNDP unless provided by means of a valid written amendment to the Individual Contract signed by the Individual contractor and an authorized official or appropriate contracting authority of UNDP.

7. SUBCONTRACTORS

In the event that the Individual contractor requires the services of subcontractors to perform any obligations under the Individual Contract, the Individual contractor shall obtain the prior written approval of UNDP for any such subcontractors. UNDP may, in its sole discretion, reject any proposed subcontractor or require such subcontractor's removal without having to give any justification therefore, and such rejection shall not entitle the Individual contractor to claim any delays in the performance, or to assert any excuses for the non-performance, of any of its obligations under the Individual Contract. The Individual contractor shall be solely responsible for all services and obligations performed by its subcontractors. The terms of any subcontract shall be subject to, and shall be construed in a manner that is fully in accordance with, all of the terms and conditions of the Individual Contract.

8. USE OF NAME, EMBLEM OR OFFICIAL SEAL OF THE UNITED NATIONS

9. INDEMNIFICATION

The Individual contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold and save harmless UNDP, and its officials, agents and employees, from and against all suits, proceedings, claims, demands, losses and liability of any kind or nature, including, but not limited to, all litigation costs and expenses, attorney's fees, settlement payments and damages, based on, arising from, or relating to: (a) allegations or claims that the use by UNDP of any patented device, any copyrighted material or any other goods or services provided to UNDP for its use under the terms of the Individual Contract, in whole or in part, separately or in combination, constitutes an infringement of any patent, copyright, trademark or other intellectual property right of any third party; or (b) any acts or omissions of the Individual contractor, or of any subcontractor or anyone directly or indirectly employed by them in the performance of the Individual Contract, which give rise to legal liability to anyone not a party to the Individual Contract, including, without limitation, claims and liability in the nature of a claim for workers' compensation.

10. INSURANCE

The Individual contractor shall pay UNDP promptly for all loss, destruction or damage to the property of UNDP caused by the Individual contractor, or of any subcontractor, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by them in the performance of the Individual Contract. 11. ENCUMBRANCES AND LIENS

on file or to remain on file in any public office or on file with UNDP against any monies due to the Individual contractor or to become due for any work done or against any goods supplied or materials furnished under the Individual Contract, or by reason of any other claim or demand against the Individual contractor.

12. FORCE MAJEURE; OTHER CHANGES IN CONDITIONS

In the event of and as soon as possible after the occurrence of any cause constituting *force majeure*, the Individual contractor shall give notice and full particulars in writing to UNDP of such occurrence or cause if the Individual contractor is thereby rendered unable, wholly or in part, to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under the Individual Contract. The Individual contractor shall also notify UNDP of any other changes in conditions or the occurrence of any event, which interferes or threatens to interfere with its performance of the Individual Contract. Not more than fifteen (15) days following the provision of such notice of *force majeure* or other changes in conditions or occurrence, the Individual contractor shall also submit a statement to UNDP of estimated expenditures that will likely be incurred for the duration of the change in conditions or the event. On receipt of the notice or notices required hereunder, UNDP shall take such action as it considers, in its sole discretion, to be appropriate or necessary in the circumstances, including the granting to the Individual contractor of a reasonable extension of time in which to perform any obligations under the Individual Contract.

If the Individual contractor is rendered permanently unable, wholly or in part, by reason of *force majeure* to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under the Individual Contract, UNDP shall have the right to suspend or terminate the Individual Contract on the same terms and conditions as are provided for below, under "Termination", except that the period of notice shall be five (5) days instead of any other period of notice. Force majeure as used herein means any unforeseeable and irresistible act of nature, any act of war (whether declared or not), invasion, revolution, insurrection, or any other acts of a similar nature or force, *provided that* such acts arise from causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the Individual contractor. The Individual contractor acknowledges and agrees that, with respect to any obligations under the Individual Contract that the Individual contractor must perform in or for any areas in which UNDP is engaged in, preparing to engage in, or disengaging from any peacekeeping, humanitarian or similar operations, any delay or failure to perform such obligations arising from or relating to harsh conditions within such areas or to any incidents of civil unrest occurring in such areas shall not, in and of itself, constitute *force majeure* under the Individual Contract.

13. TERMINATION

Either party may terminate the Individual Contract, in whole or in part, upon giving written notice to the other party. The period of notice shall be five (5) days in the case of Individual Contracts for a total period of less than two (2) months and fourteen (14) days in the case of contracts for a longer period. The initiation of conciliation or arbitral proceedings, as provided below, shall not be deemed to be a "cause" for or otherwise to be in itself a termination of the Individual Contract.

UNDP may, without prejudice to any other right or remedy available to it, terminate the Individual Contract forthwith in the event that: (a) the Individual contractor is adjudged bankrupt, or is Article II, section 7, of the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations provides, *inter alia*, that the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs, is exempt from all direct taxes, except charges for public utility services, and is exempt from customs restrictions, duties and charges of a similar nature in respect of articles imported or exported for its official use. In the event any governmental authority refuses to recognize the exemptions of the United Nations from such taxes, restrictions, duties or charges, the Individual contractor shall immediately consult with UNDP to determine a mutually acceptable procedure. UNDP shall have no liability for taxes, duties or other similar charges payable by the Individual contractor in respect of any amounts paid to the Individual contractor under this Individual Contract, and the Individual contractor acknowledges that UNDP will not issue any statements of earnings to the Individual contractor in respect of any such payments.

liquidated, or becomes insolvent, applies for moratorium or stay on any payment or repayment obligations, or applies to be declared insolvent; (b) the Individual contractor is granted a moratorium or a stay or is declared insolvent; the Individual contractor makes an assignment for the benefit of one or more of its creditors; (c) a Receiver is appointed on account of the insolvency of the Individual contractor; (d) the Individual contractor offers a settlement in lieu of bankruptcy or receivership; or (e) UNDP reasonably determines that the Individual contractor has become subject to a materially adverse change in its financial condition that threatens to endanger or otherwise substantially affect the ability of the Individual contractor to perform any of its obligations under the Individual Contract.

In the event of any termination of the Individual Contract, upon receipt of notice of termination by UNDP, the Individual

contractor shall, except as may be directed by UNDP in the notice of termination or otherwise in writing: (a) take immediate steps to bring the performance of any obligations under the Individual Contract to a close in a prompt and orderly manner, and in doing so, reduce expenses to a minimum; (b) refrain from undertaking any further or additional commitments under the Individual Contract as of and following the date of receipt of such notice; (c) deliver all completed or partially completed plans, drawings, information and other property that, if the Individual Contract had been completed, would be required to be furnished to UNDP thereunder; (d) complete performance of the work not terminated; and (e) take any other action that may be necessary, or that UNDP may direct in writing, for the protection and preservation of any property, whether tangible or intangible, related to the Individual Contract that is in the possession of the Individual contractor and in which UNDP has or may be reasonably expected to acquire an interest. In the event of any termination of the Individual Contract, UNDP shall only be liable to pay the Individual contractor compensation on a *pro rata* basis for no more than the actual amount of work performed to the satisfaction of UNDP in accordance with the requirements of the Individual Contract. Additional costs incurred by UNDP resulting from the termination of the Individual Contract by the Individual contractor may be withheld from any amount otherwise due to the Individual contractor from UNDP.

14. NON-EXCLUSIVITY

UNDP shall have no obligation respecting, and no limitations on, its right to obtain goods of the same kind, quality and quantity, or to obtain any services of the kind described in the Individual Contract, from any other source at any time.

15. TAXATION

Article II, section 7, of the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations provides, *inter alia*, that the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs, is exempt from all direct taxes, except charges for public utility services, and is exempt from customs restrictions, duties and charges of a similar nature in respect of articles imported or exported for its official use. In the event any governmental authority refuses to recognize the exemptions of the United Nations from such taxes, restrictions, duties or charges, the Individual contractor shall immediately consult with UNDP to determine a mutually acceptable procedure. UNDP shall have no liability for taxes, duties or other similar charges payable by the Individual contractor in respect of any amounts paid to the Individual contractor under this Contract, and the Individual contractor acknowledges that UNDP will not issue any statements of earnings to the Individual contractor in respect of any such payments.

16. AUDIT AND INVESTIGATION

Each invoice paid by UNDP shall be subject to a post-payment audit by auditors, whether internal or external, of UNDP or by other authorized and qualified agents of UNDP at any time during the term of the Individual Contract and for a period of two (2) years following the expiration or prior termination of the Individual Contract. UNDP shall be entitled to a refund from the Individual contractor for any amounts shown by such audits to have been paid by UNDP other than in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Individual Contract.

The Individual contractor acknowledges and agrees that, from time to time, UNDP may conduct investigations relating to any aspect of the Individual Contract or the award thereof, the obligations performed under the Individual Contract, and the operations of the Individual contractor generally relating to performance of the Individual Contract. The right of UNDP to conduct an investigation and the Individual contractor's obligation to comply with such an investigation shall not lapse upon expiration or prior termination of the Individual Contract. The Individual contractor shall provide its full and timely cooperation with any such inspections, post-payment audits or investigations. Such cooperation shall include, but shall not be limited to, the Individual contractor's obligation to make available its personnel and any relevant documentation for such purposes at reasonable times and on reasonable conditions and to grant to UNDP access to the Individual contractor's premises at reasonable times and on reasonable conditions in connection with such access to the Individual contractor's personnel and relevant documentation. The Individual contractor shall require its agents, including, but not limited to, the Individual contractor's attorneys, accountants or other advisers, to reasonably cooperate with any inspections, post-payment audits or investigations carried out by UNDP hereunder.

17. SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

Amicable Settlement: UNDP and the Individual contractor shall use their best efforts to amicably settle any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of the Individual Contract or the breach, termination or invalidity thereof. Where the parties wish to seek such an amicable settlement through conciliation, the conciliation shall take place in accordance with the Conciliation Rules then obtaining of the United Nations Commission on International Trade Law ("UNCITRAL"), or according to such other procedure as may be agreed between the parties in writing.

Arbitration: Any dispute, controversy or claim between the parties arising out of the Individual Contract, or the breach, termination, or invalidity thereof, unless settled amicably, as provided above, shall be referred by either of the parties to arbitration in accordance with the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules then obtaining. The decisions of the arbitral tribunal shall be based on general principles of international commercial law. For all evidentiary questions, the arbitral tribunal shall be guided by the Supplementary Rules Governing the Presentation and Reception of Evidence in International Commercial Arbitration of the International Bar Association, 28 May 1983 edition. The arbitral tribunal shall be empowered to order the return or destruction of goods or any property, whether tangible or intangible, or of any confidential information provided under the Individual Contract, order the termination of the Individual Contract, or order that any other protective measures be taken with respect to the goods, services or any other property, whether tangible or intangible, or of any confidential information provided under the Individual Contract, as appropriate, all in accordance with the authority of the arbitral tribunal pursuant to Article 26 ("Interim Measures of Protection") and Article 32 ("Form and Effect of the Award") of the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules. The arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award punitive damages. In addition, unless otherwise expressly provided in the Individual Contract, the arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award interest in excess of the London Inter-Bank Offered Rate ("LIBOR") then prevailing, and any such interest shall be simple interest only. The parties shall be bound by any arbitration award rendered as a result of such arbitration as the final adjudication of any such dispute, controversy or claim.

18. LIMITATION ON ACTIONS:

Except with respect to any indemnification obligations in Article 7, above, or as are otherwise set forth in the Individual Contract, any arbitral proceedings in accordance with Article 17 above, arising out of the Individual Contract must be commenced within three years after the cause of action has accrued.

The Parties further acknowledge and agree that, for these purposes, a cause of action shall accrue when the breach actually occurs, or, in the case of latent defects, when the injured Party knew or should have known all of the essential elements of the cause of action, or in the case of a breach of warranty, when tender of delivery is made, except that, if a warranty extends to future performance of the goods or any process or system and the discovery of the breach consequently must await the time when such goods or other process or system is ready to perform in accordance with the requirements of the Individual Contract, the cause of action accrues when such time of future performance actually begins.

19. PRIVILEGES AND IMMUNITIES

Nothing in or relating to the Individual Contract shall be deemed a waiver, express or implied, of any of the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs.

INTERVIEW
