TERMS OF REFERENCE (TOR)

Promotion of and support for gender equality measures among the private sector in Georgia

Geographic coverage: Georgia

Duration: 18 months, throughout 15 April 2019 – 14 October 2020

Background

UN Women is grounded in the vision of equality enshrined in the Charter of the United Nations. UN Women works for the elimination of discrimination against women and girls, the empowerment of women and the achievement of equality between women and men as partners and beneficiaries of development. Placing women's rights at the center of all its efforts, UN Women leads and coordinates United Nations system efforts to ensure that commitments on gender equality and gender mainstreaming translate into action throughout the world. It provides strong and coherent leadership in supporting national priorities and efforts, building effective partnerships with civil society and other relevant actors.

Enhancing women's possibilities to create and expand sustainable businesses is essential to the achievement of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. It is increasingly clear that without the engagement of the private sector in promoting women's empowerment within and outside the workplace, gender equality cannot be achieved.

In Georgia, only 51% of women are reportedly employed compared to 64% of men.¹ There is little to no gap between male and female educational attainment, highlighting the disproportionate challenges faced by young women transitioning from education to work. The gender wage gap is clear: In 2017 the average monthly nominal salary equaled 770 GEL for women, and 1 197 GEL for men.² Gender inequalities are most acute in the rural areas. Gender stereotypes, unequal division of unpaid agricultural and domestic work and a lack of gender-responsive services and programmes limit women's abilities to acquire new skills, develop agricultural or other businesses and earn sustainable income.³ Female entrepreneurs face challenges with access to finance, information, training, access to networks for business purposes as well as reconciling business and family concerns.

Within this context, with the support of the Norwegian Ministry for Foreign Affairs, UN Women is implementing the 3-year project "A Joint Action for Women's Economic Empowerment in Georgia (JAWE)". The project seeks to enhance the private sector's role in promoting women's economic empowerment in Georgia, while also directly supporting women, including women entrepreneurs, with capacity development. The overall goal is that women, particularly the poorest and most excluded, are economically empowered and benefit from development in Georgia.

To enhance the private sector's role in women's empowerment, UN Women's JAWE project outreaches to and supports companies to implement gender-responsive measures through the tool of [Women's Empowerment Principles](#) (WEPs), the set of seven principles for empowering women at the workplace, marketplace and community. The WEPs are:

- Establish high-level corporate leadership for gender equality;
- Treat all women and men fairly at work – respect and support human rights and nondiscrimination;
- Ensure the health, safety and well-being of all women and men workers;
- Promote education, training and professional development for women;
- Implement enterprise development, supply chain and marketing practices that empower women;
- Promote equality through community initiatives and advocacy;
- Measure and publicly report on progress to achieve gender equality

To date, more than 2,200 business leaders globally have committed to implement the WEPs. In Georgia, 26 companies in Georgia have committed to the implementation of the WEPs.

For a company to join the WEPs movement, it needs to have at least 10 staff members. Once a company's CEO has decided to sign onto the WEPs in Georgia, UN Women helps the company to assess its status vis-à-vis gender equality, and to develop a WEPs Action Plan with clear targets and activities. After the WEPs Action Plan is ready, UN Women, with its partners, follows up on the Action Plan implementation. In addition, UN Women provides continuous support to companies through training them on gender equality topics and organizing advocacy and dialogue events for private sector audiences.

Although the number of WEPs companies in Georgia during the JAWE project has been increasing, there is a need to further expand the WEPs movement to ensure more women benefit from companies' efforts and to ensure that the companies that join the WEPs are supported to make women's empowerment reality.

The UN Women Georgia Country Office is now looking for a business association in Georgia to support the realization of this vision. The specific objective of the Contractor's work is to:

- Increase the number of companies that first sign onto, and then implement the WEPs in both short and long-term.

The key quantitative targets for the Contractor to achieve during the 18-month assignment are:

- At least 20 new companies in Georgia sign onto and implement the WEPs in Georgia;
- As part of their WEPs implementation, at least 15 WEPs companies revise their internal policies to make them more gender-responsive;⁴
- As part of their WEPs implementation, the WEPs companies provide new direct support⁵ to at least 200 women (in total) within the workplace, marketplace and/or community, including
 - Trainings for at least 100 women entrepreneurs for them to move up the value chain;
 - Scholarships or grants for at least 15 women;
 - Mentorships for at least 15 women;

- o Internships for at least 20 women, including survivors of domestic violence and/or women aspiring to work in male-dominated professions; and
 - o Daycare services for women workers' children.
- One legislative, policy and/or regulatory initiative derived from WEPs work that promotes gender equality and increases women's economic participation developed in close consultation with UN Women, submitted and lobbied for.

Each company should be supported to decide on their own priority Women's Empowerment Principles and be supported to devise their own actions in a participatory manner, with the support of the Contractor. Some companies may decide to focus only on certain Principles instead of implementing all seven.

Throughout the assignment, the Contractor will need to coordinate closely with UN Women and other key stakeholders involved in the UN Women project, including one or more women's business associations that also promote the WEPs in Georgia.

Scope of the work:

Under the overall guidance of UN Women Country Representative/Deputy Country Representative in Georgia and under the direct supervision of the UN Women Programme Specialist, as well as in close cooperation with the Programme Analyst, the selected Contractor will be responsible for the following tasks:

- In collaboration with UN Women, develop a detailed implementation plan for the work, including indicators and monitoring tools to be used for monitoring and assessing the progress;
- With the support of UN Women consultant/trainings and desk review of available documentation on the WEPs (in English), develop internal capacity of the Contractor in the WEPs;

Note: UN Women will offer capacity building to at least two members of the Contractor on the WEPs through a Training of Trainers, tentatively in April 2019. The training will take place in Tbilisi and will be free-of-charge.

- Identify companies (each with at least 10 staff members) that could sign onto the WEPs;
- Outreach to companies to introduce the WEPs to them through info sessions, meetings, one-to-one communication and other methods and identify at least 20 companies for joining the WEPs movement in Georgia.⁶
- Support gender gaps' analysis at the 20 newly identified WEPs companies, as well as their WEPs Action Plan development and revision of internal policies.

Note: UN Women will provide initial coaching to the Contractor for the conduct of gender gaps' analysis and WEPs Action Plan development in at least three first WEPs signee companies identified by the Contractor.

- Support the signing of at least 20 businesses into the WEPs online and their adoption of WEPs Action Plans;
- Based on consultations with companies, develop a practical WEPs tool under one of the Principles (for example, a checklist for gender-responsive recruitment);
- Test the draft WEPs tool with at least 5 companies, and after addressing the inputs, provide 1-day trainings for representatives of at least 15 companies to roll it out;
- Follow up on the implementation of the WEPs Action Plans and support the implementation of the WEPs at least 20 companies. The follow-up and support will ensure the WEPs companies implement the WEPs, and as part of the implementation, a) at least 15 WEPs companies revise their internal policies; and b) the WEPs companies provide new support to at least 200 women. The support provided by the Contractor to the WEPs companies will include
 - Provision of advice for the WEPs companies' revision of internal policies and practices (to ensure at least 15 companies make their policies more gender-responsive);
 - Assisting the WEPs companies to design and provide new scholarships, mentorships, internships or grants for women;
 - Helping the WEPs companies to design and roll out new women's training or other capacity development programmes;
 - Assisting the WEPs companies to develop placement programmes for women in vulnerable situations (e.g. women survivors of violence);
 - Supporting the WEPs companies to analyze and adjust their products/services so that they better respond to women's needs;
 - Supporting the WEPs companies to collect and analyze sex-disaggregated data, for example, on employee satisfaction;
 - Assisting the WEPs companies to design and start provision of daycare services; and/or
 - Facilitating public-private partnerships between WEPs companies and government stakeholders for women's empowerment; and/or
 - Linking the WEPs companies to relevant civil society organizations, women suppliers or other relevant stakeholders.

Note: The WEPs signee companies in Georgia will also get access to UN Women's other WEPs support activities in 2019-2020, such as relevant training and/or experience sharing and advocacy events.

- In close consultation with the WEPs companies, and in close cooperation with UN Women develop at least one legislative, policy and/or regulatory initiative stemming from WEPs that promotes gender equality and increases women's economic participation, as well as submit and strategically lobby it to the relevant government stakeholders; and
- Develop, in consultation with companies, a sustainability plan for the Contractor's further work in supporting women's economic empowerment through the WEPs.

Timeframe:

Qualifications of the Contractor:

The Contractor engaged to undertake the assignment must fulfil the following requirements;

- Officially registered legal entity in Georgia;
- Has a proven network of at least 50 companies in Georgia;
- Has at least 5 years of experience in working with private sector in Georgia;
- Has at least 3 years of proven experience in technical support/business consulting to the private sector; and
- Previous experience working with international organizations will be considered an asset.

Qualifications of the Team:

The Contractor is requested to include in the proposal the team composition with recent CVs. At the minimum, the team should include a team leader and two team members.

Qualifications of the team leader:

- Master's degree (or equivalent) in Gender Studies, Business Management, Law, Economics or a related field.
- At least 5 years of proven experience in designing and implementing technical support/business consulting services targeting private sector companies;
- At least 2 years of managerial and leadership experience in assignments that involve coordinating and implementation of multiple tasks involving different stakeholders and clients;
- Demonstrated knowledge of women's empowerment and gender equality issues in Georgia, especially in relation to the labour market;
- Previous experience in working on Corporate Social Responsibility issues is an asset.
- Previous experience in working with UN agencies or other international organizations is an asset; and
- Language qualifications: Fluency in English; Fluency in Georgian.

Qualifications of team members:

- Bachelor's degree (or equivalent) in Gender Studies, Business Management, Law, Economics or a related field;
- At least 2 years of proven experience in designing and implementing technical support/business consulting services targeting private sector companies;
- At least one of the team members needs to have demonstrated knowledge of women's empowerment and gender equality issues;
- Previous experience in working on Corporate Social Responsibility issues is an asset; and
- Language qualifications: Fluency in English; Fluency in Georgian.

EVALUATION METHODOLOGY AND CRITERIA

1. Preliminary Evaluation

The preliminary evaluation is done to determine whether the offers meet the administrative requirements and Eligibility Criteria of the RFP. The standard eligibility criteria for suppliers wishing to engage in a contract are laid out below. Further information on doing business with UN Women/ how to become UN Women vendor can be found on [UN Women's website](#).

Legal Capacity: Bidders may be a private, public or government-owned legal entity or any association with legal capacity to enter into a binding Contract with the United Nations Entity for Gender Equality and the Empowerment of Women (UN Women).

Conflict of Interest: Bidders must disclose any actual or potential conflict of interest and they shall be deemed ineligible for this procurement process unless such conflict of interest is resolved in a manner acceptable to UN Women. Conflict of interest is present when:

- A Bidder has a close business or family relationship with a UN Women personnel who: (i) are directly or indirectly involved in the preparation of the bidding documents or specifications of the contract, and/or the bid evaluation process of such contract; or (ii) would be involved in the implementation or supervision of such contract;
- A Bidder is associated, or has been associated in the past, directly or indirectly, with a firm or any of its affiliates which have been engaged by UN Women to provide consulting services for the preparation of the design, specifications, Terms of Reference, and other documents to be used for the procurement of the goods, services or works required in the present procurement process;
- A Bidder has an interest in other bidders, including when they have common ownership and/or management. Bidders shall not submit more than one bid, except for alternative offers, if permitted. This will result in the disqualification of all bids in which the Bidder is involved. This includes situations where a firm is the Bidder in one bid and a sub-contractor on another; however, this does not limit the inclusion of a firm as a sub-contractor in more than one bid.

Failure to disclose any actual or potential conflict of interest may lead to the Bidder being sanctioned further by UN Women.

Ineligibility Lists: A Bidder shall not be eligible to submit an offer if and when at the time of quotation submission, the Bidder:

- is included in the Ineligibility List, hosted by [UNGM](#), that aggregates information disclosed by Agencies, Funds or Programs of the UN System;
- is included in the [Consolidated United Nations Security Council Sanctions List](#), including the [UN Security Council Resolution 1267/1989 list](#);
- is included in any other Ineligibility List from a UN Women partner and if so listed in the RFP Instructions;
- is currently suspended from doing business with UN Women and removed from its vendor database(s).

Code of Conduct: All Bidders are expected to embrace the principles of the [United Nations Supplier Code of Conduct](#), reflecting the core values of the Charter of the United Nations. UN Women also expects all its suppliers to adhere to the principles of the [United Nations Global Compact](#) and recommends signing up to the [Womes Empowerment Principles](#).

Other Formal Requirements:

- Offers are signed by an authorized party, including Power of Attorney if stipulated;
- The offer is submitted as per the instructions to proposers: 4.1 and detailed in the PIS above;
- The offer is valid;
- The offer is complete and eligible.

2. Cumulative Analysis Methodology: A proposal is selected on the basis of *cumulative analysis*; the total score is obtained by combining technical and financial attributes.

A two-stage procedure will be utilized in evaluating the proposals; the technical proposal will be evaluated with a minimum pass requirement of **490** of the obtainable **700** points assigned for technical proposal. A proposal shall be rejected at this stage if it fails to achieve the minimum technical threshold of **490** of the obtainable score of **700** points prior to any price proposal being opened and compared. The financial proposal will be opened only for those entities whose technical proposal achieved the minimum technical threshold of **490** of the obtainable score of **700** points and are determined to be compliant. Non-compliant proposals will not be eligible for further consideration.

The total number of points (“maximum number of points”) which a firm/institution may obtain for its proposal is as follows:

Technical proposal: 700

Financial proposal: 300

Total number of points: 1000

Evaluation of financial proposal:

In this methodology, the maximum number of points assigned to the financial proposal is allocated to the lowest price proposal. All other price proposals receive points in inverse proportion.

A formula is as follows:

$$p = y (\mu/z)$$

Where:

p = points for the financial proposal being evaluated

y = maximum number of points for the financial proposal

μ = price of the lowest priced proposal

z = price of the proposal being evaluated

The contract shall be awarded to the proposal obtaining the overall highest score after adding the score of the technical proposal and the financial proposal.

Evaluation of technical proposal:

The technical proposal is evaluated and examined to determine its responsiveness and compliancy with the requirements specified in this solicitation documents. The quality of each technical proposal will be evaluated in accordance with the following technical evaluation criteria and the associated weighting (total possible value of 700 points):
