1. Assignment Information

2. Background

Based on the strategic partnership with the Government of Cambodia, especially with Ministry of Commerce and Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Fishery; UNDP has supported the transformation of the cassava value chain. For many years, UNDP's projects have worked on the improvement of cassava production and export of cassava-based products to diverse markets.

UNDP started the implementation of the third cassava project, called Accelerating Inclusive cassava Market Development in early October 2018 and will complete by 2021. The third phase project aims to address key bottlenecks of the cassava value chain which can increase farmer profitability so that they can retain income in the context of price fluctuation and reinforce the smooth investment process of the private sector. Therefore, further economic values can be created, retained and distributed within rural economies in the boundary of Cambodia. To achieve its goal, the project adopts a public private partnership model which loopholes within the value chain, especially sustainable cassava production and reliable system of root supply, are fulfilled. The linkage between farmers and processing factories is invented to shape winwin relationship and long-term trustful cooperation of the two parties. In this model, resources from public and private sectors, are blended to implement a development project.

The private sector funding development projects through UNDP in the context of Cambodia is a new paradigm drawing attention of the government, development partners and investors. It demonstrates significant roles of the private sector as a locomotive of the economic growth vis a vis a development driver. The private funding, in this circumstance, reflects different pictures which can be as social corporate responsibilities, charity or direct contribution to mitigate risks affecting their investment. Whatever of the intention of this funding, it is important to know the practicality of PPP spearheaded by the project.

In line with the goal which intends to bring positive impacts on the cassava sector, particularly to small-holder farmers, the project is looking for a consultant to conduct the project development impact assessment.

3. Scope of Work

The assignment aims to assess development results which the project brings to the cassava small-holder farmers and document knowledge useful to enhance the effectiveness of UNDP's development approaches. It expects to analyze and gather evidence of impacts which the

project attributes to farmer groups, in line with, but not limited to, the following questions:

- To what extend can the project raise cassava productivity of farmers in its target areas?
- To what extend does the improvement of cassava productivity contribute to household income?
- What are costs and benefits of the contract farming which farmers and the starch processing factory bear or receive? How to scale up and make it sustainable?
- How does the project contribute to livelihood improvement of cassava smallholder farmers?

The impact assessment will focus on groups of farmers in Snoul district, Kratie province. Below table briefly highlights the different supports provided by the project entailing its target farmers group and target impact.

Below are the key expected outputs of the assignment:

- **1.** Baseline survey report
- 2. Follow up survey
- **3.** End line survey report

The primary responsibility of the consultant is to develop a rural household survey methodology, conduct survey two times during the project implementation (once for baseline in August 2019, and once during the end of the project end of 2020), carry out a preliminary assessment following each survey, design a small-scale follow-up survey and train project staff on the administration of the follow-up survey. Note that the contracted expert is not responsible for administering the follow-up survey.

All these activities should be carried out in consultation with, and under the guidance of the project team, UNDP Cambodia Country Office.

To complete this assignment, the consultant expects to deliver the following tasks:

- Develop Inception report containing methodology to deliver the assignment. The report shall include survey methodology with identification of survey target groups, questionnaire for the survey, initial proposal of baseline report outline, initial design of database;
- Conduct desk review about the project (documents to be provided by project team);
- Conduct survey;
- Analyze data and write a report up to expectation and required quality standard
- Present the findings to UNDP's project team and validated the report with stakeholders as required

Highlight of the key milestone tasks:

- Developing a survey methodology

The survey methodology should meet the following criteria:

- Establishing the baseline status for beneficiaries for impact indicators under question
- Establishing control group as appropriate for the case of the project
- Identifying variables that potentially affect the impact indicators and including them in the survey instrument

- Developing initial proposal of the outline of the baseline report

- Developing household survey questionnaire

• Developing, testing, finalizing and translating (into local language) the household questionnaire

The contracted consultant is required to develop a sample questionnaire based on consultations with the project team and UNDP, taking into consideration the criteria for survey methodology listed above. It should carry out a trial administration of the questionnaire before finalizing the instrument.

- <u>Conducting survey with target groups</u>

• The consultant is expected to conduct survey with the target groups.

Developing data entry format

- Once the field survey is complete, data should be entered Excel
- Double data entry is required
- A discrepancy check should be carried out once double data entry is conducted
- Final dataset should contain rows, each representing a single household, and columns, each representing a single variable
- First row of the table should contain the names of variables without space

- Developing quality control method

The survey package should include a proposal set of measures to ensure high quality data collection during the field survey;

- Developing baseline/Preliminary report

Once data entry is complete, the contracted institution is required to produce a preliminary assessment report that contains key summary statistics and comparison of treatment and control groups.

- Developing of a small-scale follow-up survey

The small-scale survey is designed to be used by project staff on a more frequent basis to capture changes that may occur between the time of baseline survey and end-line survey. Thus, the survey should be a subset of the larger-scale survey.

5. Institutional Arrangements, Duration of the Work and Duty Station

7. Duty Station

Given the nature of the assignment, the contractor may find alternative working locations at his/her own expense. The duty station of the work is Phnom Penh, Cambodia with travel to

Kratie and nearby communes of Thborngkhmum and Mundulkiri Provinces to conduct stakeholder interview, visit the project sites, collect information/data, and carry out activities.

The Daily Substantive Allowance (DSA) to the province should be included in the proposal, the project will cover the transportation cost.

To carry out this assignment, the consultant expects to go to the provinces as per the following tentative schedule:

- First mission is expected to be conducted during the 2nd week of September 2019 to conduct a baseline study. The field work may take **five (5) days**;
- Second mission is expected to be conducted in **early September 2020** to gather data and produce the end-line project assessment. The field work may take **five (5) days**.
