A two-stage procedure is utilized in evaluating the submissions, with evaluation of the technical components being completed prior to any price proposals being opened and compared. Interview with the shortlisted candidates will be conducted at the technical evaluation stage.

The price proposal will be opened only for submissions that passed the minimum technical score of 70% of the obtainable score of 1000 points in the evaluation of the technical component. The technical component is evaluated on the basis of its responsiveness to the Term of Reference (TOR). Maximum 1000 points will be given to the lowest offer and the other financial proposals will receive the points inversely proportional to their financial offers. i.e. Sf = 1000 x Fm / F, in which Sf is the financial score, Fm is the lowest price and F the price of the submission under consideration.

The weight of technical points is 70% and financial points is 30%.

Submission obtaining the highest weighted points (technical points + financial points) will be selected subject to positive reference checks on the consultant's past performance.

I. BACKGROUND & PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Legal and judicial reform has been an important national strategy of Viet Nam, which has been highlighted in five consecutive Resolutions of National Party Congress of the Communist Party, from the 9th to the 13th.¹ In particular, the Resolution of the 13th National Party Congress underscores the need to improve the legal systems, mechanisms and policies "in order to strongly promote socialist democracy and sovereignty of the people."² This direction, coupled with the long-standing orientation of the country's leadership to international integration,³ prompts the need for Viet Nam to improve the existing regulations while learning international legal principles and practices that Viet Nam have not applied. The need to look outwardly to learn from international experiences is more pressing with rules that might enable Viet Nam to fulfill their commitments in the field of criminal justice, under a number of relevant UN Human Rights mechanisms, including the Universal Periodic Review (UPR), the Convention against Torture (CAT) and the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR).

The death penalty is a punishment that deprives a person of their life when that person has been convicted – by a legally established court as regulated by a legal system – of having committed a serious crime, which should be strictly applied for crimes of extreme gravity, involving intentional killing.⁴

There is a growing global consensus that the death penalty needs to be removed to ensure the effective implementation of the right to life under the Article 3 of the Universal Declaration on Human Rights and the Article 6 of the ICCPR. Currently, more than 70% of countries in the world have abolished capital punishment in law or practice.⁵

During the third review cycle under UPR that took place in 2019, Viet Nam accepted a number of recommendations on the death penalty by several members states, to which, Viet Nam stated its "firm commitment that the application of this punishment in reality will strictly be in conformity with the ICCPR [...]".⁶ Under ICCPR, Viet Nam also received priority recommendations by the Human Rights Committee to further narrow the application of the punishment as well as to consider introducing a moratorium on the use of the sentence in both law and practice.⁷ To realise this commitment, in 2019, the Government of Viet Nam issued two major national instruments on human rights – the National Master Plan for the Implementation of the Third Cycle UPR's Recommendations (UPR Master Plan) and the National Master Plan for the Implementation of the ICCPR and Recommendations of the UN Human Rights Committee (ICCPR Master Plan). Both plans delegate tasks on state agencies to explore the possibility of further limiting the scope of application of the death penalty.

Narrowing the scope of application of capital punishment requires alternative sanctions, inter alia, which was one of the key recommendations that the study "On the possibility of Viet Nam ratifying the Second Optional Protocol to the ICCPR aiming at the Abolition of the Death Penalty" provided to Viet Nam. This study was produced by UNDP and the Ministry of Justice under the EU Justice and Legal Empowerment Programme. In particular, the Study suggests Viet Nam to:

"Conduct further studies on alternative sanctions, on the basis of Vietnam's practices and international experience, to provide relevant recommendations while ensuring humanity in Viet Nam's criminal policy and the requirements to fight against crime."⁸

Despite recommendations by research, experts and the international community, as well as strong commitments of Viet Nam to realise these recommendations, alternatives to

the capital punishment that are feasible to apply in Viet Nam have not been studied adequately.

The right to self-defense

The revision of the Penal Code and Criminal Procedure Code in 2015 has been one of the highlights in the development of Viet Nam's criminal justice system. By incorporating adversarial principals and elements in to the criminal procedure, the Codes gives more rights to the accused and their defense counsel. One of the key elements of adversarial principle guaranteed by the Codes is the right to defense. The right to defense has two connotations: The right to self-defense and the right to be defended/represented by a defense counsel (a.k.a. the right to a lawyer).

Article 16 of the Criminal Procedure Code states that: "The accused has the right to defend himself, [or] having a lawyer or another person defend him/her". To enable this right, Article 16 puts competent agencies and persons conducting legal proceedings in charge to "notify, explain and ensure" that the accused's enjoyment in accordance with the provisions of the Code. As regard to the right to self-defense, even though the wordings of the Code clarifies the right and duty-bearer of such right, the Code and its guiding decrees do not elaborate further on enable conditions for an accused (including detainees) to exercise this right. The lack of accountability for creating enable conditions has posed a challenge in the enjoyment of the right in practice.

In responding to the gaps in literature on the mentioned issues, UNDP and the SPC commission two consultants to conduct a research study entitled: "Application of alternatives to capital punishment and the right to self-defense in criminal proceedings: International experiences and recommendations for Viet Nam." The two consultants include one international consultant (IC) and one national consultant (NC). Findings from this research project will inform the SPC's policy proposals to law-making bodies.

This activity is supported by the EU Justice and Legal Empowerment Programme (EU JULE), implemented by UNDP and UNICEF together with relevant State agencies. EU JULE is designed to strengthen the rule of law through a more reliable, trusted and better accessed justice system, and specifically to increase access to justice for women, children and those groups which face the greatest obstacles in using the justice system to invoke their rights.
