1. BACKGROUND

Biodiversity Finance Initiative (BIOFIN) Nepal aims to contribute to effective and efficient biodiversity finance and outcomes by designing comprehensive finance solutions to assure long-term and steady financial flows to conservation engaging government, conservation partners, private sector and civil societies. In this regards, BIOFIN Nepal intends to assess biodiversity related expenditure of buffer zone institutions/conservation area related institutions and likely consequences to them from the current decentralization processes of the country.

2. SCOPE OF WORK, RESPONSIBILITIES AND DESCRIPTION OF THE PROPOSED ANALYTICAL WORK

5. FINANCIAL PROPOSAL

1. INTRODUCTION

Nepal is committed to conservation and sustainable utilisation of biodiversity for the "prosperity of people & nation". The government enacted the National Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan (2014-2020) (NBSAP) in 2014, which provides a strategic framework for the biodiversity conservation in Nepal. The strategy has set different biodiversity targets that aligns to the Aichi targets. The review of Nepal's Sixth national report to the Convention of the Biodiversity (CBD) reveals that nearly two-thirds of the national biodiversity targets (38 out of 56) are in progress but at an insufficient rate. Likewise, half of the (10 out of 20) Aichi targets are progressing at an insufficient rate. Inadequate resource mobilisation is one of the prime reasons for slow progress in achieving biodiversity targets. In recent decades, biodiversity finance tools and solutions have demonstrated their importance for achieving biodiversity goals and sustainable development objectives. However, countries have not approached the issue of biodiversity finance in a comprehensive manner, where choice and adoption of financial solutions have remained experimental and opportunistic.

Considering this, the Biodiversity Finance Initiative (BIOFIN) was developed "as global programme" to provide a comprehensive methodology for government to (a) review the existing policy context (b) measure expenditure level for biodiversity (c) calculate future financial needs and (d) design strategic plans to deploy right mix financial of the finance solutions, tailored to the country context. It has developed, piloted and continuously improved the methodology to design comprehensive plans to implement finance tools and solutions, that increase financing, effectiveness and efficiency on biodiversity management. The BIOFIN Phase I (2012-2018) developed and piloted the methodological framework (BIOFIN Workbook) to help countries mobilise sufficient resources to implement national biodiversity policies in 30 countries. BIOFIN Phase II (2018-2022) will enable the 30 countries to implement priority finance solutions and prepare a financial plan for an additional 5 countries.

BIOFIN Nepal aims to contribute to effective and efficient biodiversity finance and outcomes by designing comprehensive finance solutions to assure long-term and steady financial flows to conservation engaging government, conservation partners, private sector and civil societies. This will be achieved through four specific outputs.

- **Biodiversity Finance Policy and Institutional Review (PIR).** The PIR analyses the country's current policies, institutions and existing finance mechanisms and tools associated with biodiversity and ecosystem services in order to evaluate their impact and effectiveness and to understand key entry points and opportunities for effecting change.
- **Biodiversity Expenditure Review (BER).** The Biodiversity Expenditure Review helps countries to establish a firm baseline of historic and current biodiversity expenditure levels and future projections in comparison to the underlying institutional and policy vision and framework.
- **Financial Needs Assessment (FNA).** The FNA is a detailed realistic costing of key biodiversity policies and plans – generally focused on the National Biodiversity Strategy and Action Plan (NBSAP). This involves an estimation of the financial needs and a prioritisation of actions for biodiversity management across all sectors of government, NGOs and can include private sector investments.
- **Biodiversity Finance Plan (BFP).** The Biodiversity Finance Plan is a national strategy and plan for financing biodiversity addressing all possible dimensions of finance, including resource mobilization, improving impact delivery, avoiding future expenditures and re-aligning expenditures towards biodiversity goals.

Nepal is part of the BIOFIN Phase II (2018-2022). Environment and Biodiversity Division of the Ministry of Forests and Environment (MOFE), is leading the BIOFIN process. The Ministry hosts a dedicated team of experts to undertake technical work and coordinate day to day management of the BIOFIN process in Nepal. UNDP is providing technical assistance to the overall process.

2. RATIONALE

Nepal is a country endowed with natural resources and biodiversity. Till date, there are a total of 20 Protected Areas including 12 National Parks, 1 Wildlife Reserves, 6 Conservation Areas and 1 Hunting Reserve established to conserve rare and endangered wildlife, including floral and faunal diversity. Moreover, 13 buffer zones are declared around the national park and wildlife reserve to promote integrated and long-term conservation management by improving co-operation among Protected Areas and Buffer Zone communities covering 16.5 percent of the total area under the protected area system of the country. Likewise, the conservation area covers 15425.95 sq km, which is 44.8 of the protected area systems. The protected areas are governed by the government where the buffer zone was receiving 30-50% of the income from the protected area. Similarly, the conservation area was either handed over to the local community, national non-government organizations or managed by the government where the revenue generated them are distributed directly for conservation purposes conservation. Various Bio-diversity Conservation and Development Programs are being conducted with the participation of local consumers in these areas. Moreover, they were also contributing towards revenue generation in protected areas by providing services and facilities to the tourism. However, the investment from these conservation-related institutions on the biodiversity sector in general and the extent of resource mobilization has been poorly documented. Likewise, the current constitutions of the country disrupts the setup of the institutions in two ways (a) the institutions would not be allowed to collect revenues as before following the National Natural Resource Revenue and Fiscal Commission Act, 2017, which require that all revenues are shared among three tiers of the government of the country and (b) the institutions would receive fewer revenues in total from the federal government which might jeopardize the conservation and development efforts and demotivate institutions to take active participation in conservation. However, it might also lead to increased investments in biodiversity conservation by the local government creating synergy and partnership for the conservation and development activities. The implications to these institutions from the current decentralization processes of the country is uncertain and yet poorly understood.

As a part of the biodiversity expenditure review work, the BIOFIN Nepal intends to hire a consultant to assess biodiversity related expenditure of buffer zone institutions/conservation area related institutions and likely consequences to them from the current decentralization processes of the country.

3. OBJECTIVE OF ASSIGNMENT

The overall objective of the study is to document biodiversity related expenditure of protected area related community-based institutions, especially focusing on the buffer zone and conservation area.

- Map different activities of buffer zone /conservation area management committee

- Estimate cash and kind contribution on biodiversity conservation, including revenue generation to the community as well as the state
- Examine (likely) implication of current devolution processes on these institutions
- Provide recommendations for increasing investment in the biodiversity sector

4. SCOPE OF THE WORK

The Scope of the work includes

- Review secondary sources of information on revenue generation and expenditure pattern of the buffer zone/conservation area
- Carry out a review of sectoral policies and practices concerning investment requirements of the on-biodiversity sector, including revenue generation
- Develop a detailed methodology for assessment of the kind and cash contribution of buffer zone conservation area institutions on biodiversity assessment
- Conduct rapid assessment survey of buffer zone/conservation area institutions to understand income and expenditure pattern, including non-cash expenditures
- Assess the likely consequences of the current decentralization processes on buffer zone/conservation area institutions income and expenditure on conservation
- Assess the resource leverage and partnership of the buffer zone/conservation area institutions with the local government institutions, including their role conflicts and contradictions
- Assess the role of buffer zone/conservation area institutions on addressing the national and global biodiversity goals and targets
- Produce an outline, draft and final study report in close collaboration with national and Global BIOFIN team
- Share the findings at the national stakeholders on biodiversity investment
- Prepare a small policy brief for dissemination of stakeholders

The Expected outcome of the study are as follows:

- Review of buffer zone/conservation area expenditure on biodiversity sector
- Estimation of the biodiversity related expenditure of conservation area/buffer zone institutions
- The implication of current decentralization processes on biodiversity expenditure
- Policy brief on biodiversity related expenditure of conservation area/buffer zone institutions

5. METHODOLOGY

The consultant will propose a detailed methodology, but not limited to, based on the following outline:

- Review national and international literature related to buffer zone and conservation area resource mobilisation including national and international experiences, for development of methodology
- Attends orientation sessions with the national BIOFIN team on ToR and expected outcomes before the submission of the inception report. The consultant should design and revise methodology following the discussions of orientation session.
- Interviews/Interaction with selected national-level stakeholders, provincial and local government level stakeholders including buffer zone institutions/conservation area institutions
- Conduct focus group discussion/rapid survey in at-least two buffer zone/two conservation area based on income received from protected areas
- Conducts various consultative meetings, focus group discussion and workshop to collect and collate necessary information related to the study
- Documents and analyzes the findings of the study to interpret the results with different tables and figures including a summary of recommendations.
- Debriefing through presentation and discussion on fieldwork and initial result with national BIOFIN team to get feedback and comments
- One central level presentation of the study to share study findings
