#### I. BACKGROUND

Indonesia has achieved remarkable progress in social development and economic growth over recent decades. Home to more than a quarter of a billion people, making it the fourth largest country in the world, the country has attained nearly universal primary school enrolment, reduced poverty by half<sup>1</sup> and significantly improved access to basic health services. As one example, the infant mortality rate fell from 68 to 32 within a couple of decades.<sup>2</sup> Such medical advances are supported by a growing economy that regularly records GDP growth rates of higher than five per cent and is viewed as one of the fundamental pillars of the rapidly growing South-East Asian economy.

Despite this laudable success, pockets of violent extremism and acts of terrorism continue to persist in many parts of the country. In respond to the issue, the UNODC, UNDP and UN Women have developed a strong relationship with the Government of Indonesia, both in national and subnational levels, to support the efforts in preventing violent extremism. In 2019, the three UN agencies in Indonesia launched the "GUYUB Project" that focuses in East Java, to provide a coordinated, coherent response to the underlying root causes of violent extremism.

The overall goal of GUYUB Project is to tackle the root causes of violent extremism in East Java so that it no longer poses a threat in the region and beyond. To reach the goal, UNODC seeks to strengthen the social compact between community and government institutions at the village level, particularly law enforcement officers, to prevent violent extremism leading to terrorism.

## II. SCOPE OF WORK, ACTIVITIES, AND DELIVERABLES

#### Scope of Work

#### Specific task to be performed by the national consultant:

- 1) Strengthen the technical capacity and capability of law enforcement officials by developing and designing a training curriculum on community-level engagement for preventing violent extremism by law enforcement officials.
  - a. Conduct a desk-research on best practices and lessons learned from Indonesia, South-East Asia and at the global level on the topic ;
  - b. Design, develop, and draft one training curriculum on community-level engagement by law enforcement officials within a human security framework;
  - c. Facilitate one (1) national workshop on community-level engagement by law enforcement official with relevant stakeholder;
  - d. Conduct several consultative missions to provinces in Indonesia (including East Java) during the development of the training curriculum;
  - e. Facilitate two (2) workshops for East Java law enforcement officials which apply

the training curriculum.

- 2) Strengthen the abilities of law-enforcement officials to address the needs of vulnerable populations, including women, children and victims of terrorism, while preventing and countering violent extremism in in East Java.
  - a. Conduct a desk-research on best practices and lessons learned from Indonesia, South-East Asia and at the global level on the promotion and protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms while countering terrorism, with particular emphasis on the application of a human security framework to vulnerable individuals, including to women, children, the elderly and victims of terrorism;
  - b. Design, develop, and draft one advanced training curriculum on meeting the needs of vulnerable populations while preventing and countering violent extremism leading to terrorism, with particular emphasis on the application of a human security framework to women, children and victims of terrorism.;
  - c. Facilitate one (1) national workshop on meeting the needs of vulnerable populations while preventing and countering violent extremism leading to terrorism, with particular emphasis on the application of a human security framework to women, children, the elderly and victims of terrorism;
  - d. Conduct several consultative missions to provinces in Indonesia (including East Java) during the development of the training curriculum;
  - e. Facilitate four (4) workshops for East Java law enforcement official which apply the training curriculum.

UNODC will provide the necessary budget allocation to convene a consultative meeting with stakeholders. Support will be provided under the guidance of National Programme Officer.

## IV. REQUIREMENTS FOR EXPERIENCE AND QUALIFICATIONS

Academic and Work Qualifications:

- Master's degree or equivalent in law, police management, law enforcement, security studies, terrorism prevention, prevention or countering of violent extremism, criminology or other field related to criminal justice with minimum ten (10) years of combination working experience in community policing or criminal justice sector related to preventing violent extremism. Bachelor degree with minimum twelve (12) years of combination working experience in similar fields may be accepted.
- Proven experience in developing and facilitating training for law enforcement officers.
- Experienced working with national stakeholder (local government, BNPT, INP, CSOs).

## III. Competencies and special skills requirement:

- Communication and openness to feedback: The Consultant will be working under the supervision of and in consultation with UNODC staff members. The Consultant is also expected to collaborate and coordinate with the national consultant(s) in order to produce the deliverables under this consultancy. He or she should be able to maintain direct and frequent communication on the progress of the work as well as be open to feedback.
