I. BACKGROUND

a) Briefly describe the project rationale / background and the objectives of the project

In recent years, Indonesia has experienced a decline in the number, scale, and extremist attacks' success. However, the rise of ISIS has brought new complexity and transnational elements to violent extremism in Indonesia. For example, the blast around *Thamrin street* in the early 2016 and the bus terminal bombing in 2017 demonstrate violent extremist activity inspired in part by ISIS. The latest ones that occurred in Surabaya, 2018, have transformed the violent act patterns in violent extremism by involving women and children, acting as perpetrators of the attack.

In response to that situation, many actors have been actively engaged to prevent violent extremism. Those actors include the government of Indonesia, CSOs, academics, and religious-based mass organizations, and UN Agencies. They have been involved in developing policy in the areas of law enforcement and community-based approach that aim to reduce the risk of violent-extremism leading to terrorism.

Based on the Secretary-General's Plan of Action to Prevent Violent Extremism and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 16: Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and the European Union launched the project "Preventing Violent Extremism through Promoting Tolerance and Respect for Diversity" (PROTECT) on March 2019, aiming to reduce the risk of violent extremism in the region by taking a preventive and welfare approach with core respect to human rights, and gender mainstreaming in South-East Asia. The PROTECT project is a regional project, which is being implemented in four countries of South-East Asia: Thailand, Philippines, Malaysia, and Indonesia.

The PROTECT Project's first phase has taken the leading role in facilitating a series of policy engagement on the National Action Plan (NAP) on Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism (P/CVE) with various stakeholders. As well as support of the issuance of NAP on P/CVE, this project also contributed to filling the knowledge gap on violent extremism in Indonesia and South East Asia through several researches, as well as empowered youth through various trainings to promote tolerance, pluralism, and respect for diversity among groups in the communities.

Building on these achievements and based on a final evaluation of the first phase, the next phase of the project (2020 – 2023) will build on three key set of activities that have been identified as necessary to to secure the overall objective of the project, which are:

1. Strengthening policy assistance in order to develop, coordinate and implement National Action Plan on P/CVE;
2. National network, data and trend analysis to stakeholders to prevent violent extremism and radicalism in Indonesia is available;
3. Strengthening capacities and resilience of PVE actors towards the extremist narratives and processes to radicalism.

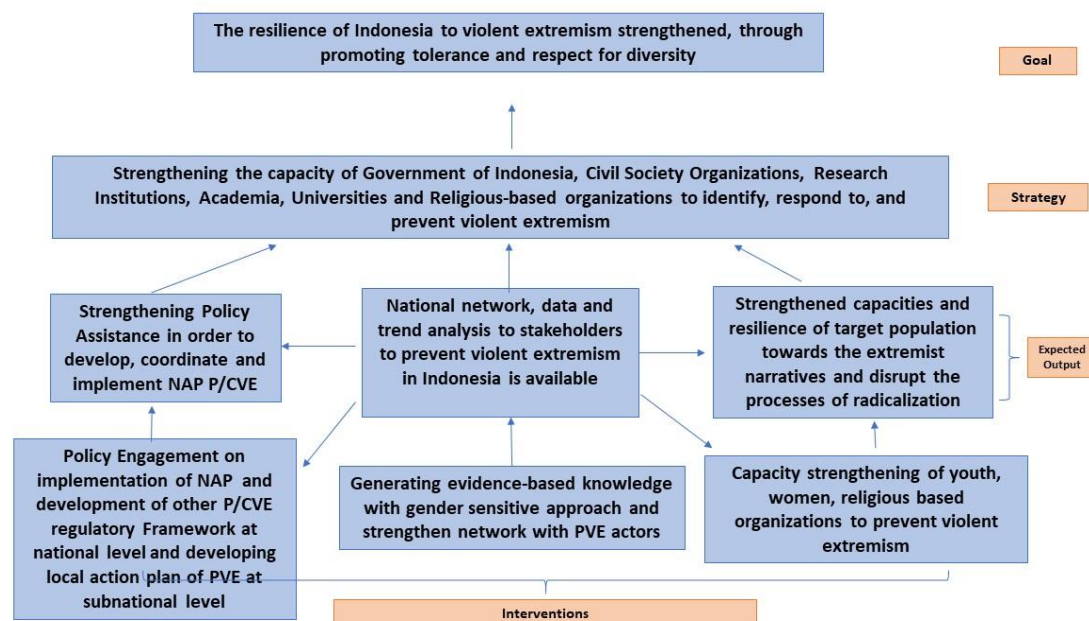
Theory of Change

This project's overall goal remains the same as the previous phase, which is to strengthen Indonesia's resilience to violent extremism by promoting tolerance and respect for diversity. To ensure that the project's objectives will be achieved, the project seeks to support the implementation of the government policies to prevent violent extremism through various policy engagement by implementing "**the whole of government**" and "**whole of society approach**."

Simultaneously, the project will also generate new knowledge with a gender-sensitive approach to fill in the existing gap to formulate evidence-based PVE policy and

programming. Information-sharing and close coordination with CSOs in the PVE area has proved pivotal in Indonesia by the CONVEY's project; therefore, the effort to strengthen the network among PVE actors will be continued after 2021. Furthermore, based on the research findings from the first phase of the project, the project will strengthen the efforts of youth, women, and various religious organizations to prevent and respond to extremist narratives through various activities.

The theory of change model is illustrated below:



The target beneficiaries of this project include: National Government Institutions, Local Governments, Educational Institutions, Youth, Women Organizations, Religious-Based Organizations, Online Media of Religious-based Organizations, and CSOs.

b) Briefly describe the context of the required services

The IC consultant will be responsible to conduct baseline survey of the PROTECT project targeted **2,500 Households** (disaggregated by location, sex, age, education level, religion, and employment status) that will be conducted with mixed-method methodology, in a technically as well as ethically proper manner. The survey's main purpose is to create and implement a specific set of monitoring indicators related to youth, women, government institutions, educational institutions, Religious-Based Organizations, online media of Religious-Based Organizations, and women's CSO engaged in reducing the risk of radicalizing members of their communities and encountering radicalization messages and hate speech on social media. The surveys will generate information and data on:

1. Percentage of community members in areas where the EU-funded action has been implemented and who feel that the EU funded action has reduced the risk of radicalization of a member of their community;
2. Percentage of people that have encountered radicalization messages and hate speech on social media who:
 - (a) indicate they do not identify with, believe in or accept these narratives;
 - (b) Indicate whether or not their friends or neighbours believe in or accept these narratives;
 - (c) took steps to seek removal (e.g. reporting to moderators);
3. Percentage of people indicating having encountered radicalization message and hate speech on social media in the past 3 (three) months; and

4. The number of vulnerable/at-risk youth who state their capacities to identify hate speech and violent extremism.
5. Percentage of stakeholders/people indicating good understanding of at least 75% of PCVE-related concepts (general public, m/f); men govt. employees (male/female) CSOs employees (male/female)

The number of sampling of this baseline survey are 2,500 Households, with detail as below:

1. 500 Household in Jakarta
2. 400 Household in Bandung, West Java
3. 400 Household in Bogor, West Java,
4. 400 Household in Makassar, South Sulawesi
5. 400 Household in Malang, East Java, and
6. 400 Household in Surakarta, Central Java

and the indicators are suitably using gender and age disaggregated data when monitoring results and impacts, for instance:

Data collection will also disaggregate between members of the general public, government and CSO employees – alongwith other criteria, such as those employed or unemployed, by levels of education etc

Location

This baseline will take place in 6 (six) chosen locations where the projects are implemented: **Jakarta, Bandung, Bogor, Malang, Makassar, and Surakarta.**

Methodology

In order to conduct the baseline survey, this section also explains some methodologies. The IC consultant, however, will design an inception report that specifies the step-by-step methods the baseline survey will use to collect the information needed to address its purpose and objectives. Besides a quantitative component, the methodology also includes a qualitative component (mixed-methods), for instance interviews with key informants, focus group discussions, and surveys. In order to conduct the survey on the key parameters, the following steps can be followed, but should not be limited to:

- **Desk Study Review:** It is important to review literature on the topic of radicalization messages and hate speech on social media in order to clearly understand the dynamic. The IC is also expected to do a social media analysis in social media platform e.g. Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, etc to capture radicalization message and hate speech condition in social media. It is mandatory to review project proposal, results framework, and other sources of data to complete the baseline assessment.
- **Survey:** a community-based survey will be conducted to have baseline data in line with the above-mentioned indicators. This short survey will collect quantitative data on radicalization messages on social media as well any other misinformation, disinformation and hate speech.
- The data collection will be conducted through online, including interview, focus-group discussions (FGD), using available platform.
- Data validation also should be conducted properly, to ensure that all data received and processed is valid. The IC consultant is expected to also conduct data validation to the related Government Institutions that similar task and functions to this issue, for instance i) The National Counter-Terrorism Agency c.q. The Deputy of Prevention, Protection and Deradicalization; (ii) The National Cyber and Crypto Agency (BSSN); (iii) The Ministry of Communications and Informatics.
- Data Analysis should be conducted to show the result of the baseline survey and provide

accurate, valid information and convincing data, which can be used as further reference by the project.

4. Emphasize the relevance/purpose of the work required and how it is linked to the project context

It is important to take stock of the current situation on how P/CVE effort must address the needs of youth, women organization, Government authorities, Educational Institutions, Religious-Based Organization, and Online media of Religious-based Organization for instance, how to build the capacities of P/CVE actors, including youth, women, Government Institutions, educational institutions in the national and sub-national level, representatives of CSOs, and women CSOs in each country to disrupt processes of radicalization and recruitment in the places where it is known to occur while promoting tolerance and respect for diversity.

Findings from this baseline survey will be drawn to clarify indicators and setting baselines to track implementation of 3 (three) years of project implementation. Subsequently, the findings will independently ascertain how the PROTECT project has contributed to strategic indicators from the regional office. The project seeks to hire an IC consultant to conduct the baseline survey.

5. List and describe the stakeholders for the project.

The PROTECT project will be implemented for and with direct participation and close partnership with:

1. The national government, such as the Coordinating Ministry for Human Development and Cultural Affairs, the Coordinating Ministry for Political, Legal and Security Affairs, the National Counter-Terrorism Agency (BNPT), the Ministry of National Development Planning (BAPPENAS), the Ministry of Religious Affairs, the Ministry of Education and Culture Affairs, the Ministry of Women Empowerment and Child Protection, Ministry of Communication and Informatics, Indonesian Witness and Victim Protection Agency (LPSK);
2. Sub-national governments and authorities in 5 targeted area: Bandung, Bogor, Makassar, Malang, and Surakarta;
3. PCVE Practitioners, Academician, Research Institute; Educational Institutions, Women Organization, Student and Youth, Religious-based organization, online media of Religious-Based Organization and
4. Civil Society Organizations (CSOs).

Stakeholders Consultation for the IC

The IC will work closely with stakeholders of the project during the conduct of the baseline survey, from the planning phase to evaluation phase. In the planning phase of the baseline survey, the IC will work closely with selected CSOs/NGOs as implementing partners of project for the activities under Output 3 (Strengthened capacities and resilience of PVE actors towards the extremist narratives and processes of radicalizations). While, for in the evaluation phase of the baseline survey, the IC will consult with key government counterparts of the project which comprises of The Coordinating Ministry for Political, Legal, and Security Affairs; The Coordinating Ministry for Human Development and Culture; and the National Counter-Terrorism Agency.

In the Indonesia context, there is an increase in intolerance and threats of terrorist attack. These dynamics potentially change the substantial work of the project, which can disrupt project implementation. For that reason, the project has developed the mitigating actions which have been stated in the PROTECT Project document to identify and respond to potential challenges.

Amidst to COVID-19 pandemic, which can unpredictability risk the project's operation, the project will follow all protocols and measures decided by the UNDP management and respective government counterparts measures to ensure that the data collection will be implemented in a safe and secure condition, mostly through available and familiar online platforms.

Scope of Work

Under the direct supervision of the National Project Manager of the PROTECT project and the Head of Democratic Governance and Poverty Reduction Unit, the IC consultant will be responsible for the following tasks:

1. In close consultation with the National Project Manager and Monitoring and Reporting Officer, prepare a design for the methodology of the baseline survey, including an appropriate sampling methodology to compare target and non-target population in a randomized control trials method, including the number of respondents and sample size for this survey (2500 Households, which detail as follow: Jakarta 500 households, Bandung 400 households, Bogor 400 households, Makassar 400 households, Malang 400 households, and Surakarta 400 households);
2. Prepare data collection tools for qualitative and quantitative data collection, include data validation and data analysis;
3. Monitor the data collection process and ensure the quality of the collected data. The IC consultant is expected to conduct/assign a team to conduct data collection and analysis, with a focus on the requirements of the project Log framework, Results Frameworks and other data needed to to measure progress against the project results framework and ensure quality assurance in M&E;
4. Make recommendations to increase the benefits of the project;.
5. Prepare comprehensive final reports for the Baseline Survey and perform other duties/functions as may be deemed necessary for project implementation and coordination.

III. WORKING ARRANGEMENTS

Institutional Arrangement

The IC consultant will report to the National Project Manager of the PROTECT project, that will directly supervise the IC Consultant for the reporting, approval, and acceptance of the outputs. The IC Consultant work in close communication with the PROTECT team of the UNDP Indonesia CO, the focal point of M & R in UNDP Indonesia CO, UNDP Bangkok Regional Hub, M & E Specialist, and other key parties/state institutions.

The Individual Consultant is expected to liaise, interact and collaborate with the PROTECT Project team of the UNDP Indonesia CO, UNDP Bangkok Regional Hub, and M & E Specialist, as well as project partners to ensure the smooth implementation of the project and the achievements from each activity conducted on the ground.

The IC is expected to be flexible and adaptable in terms of working arrangements.

Due to the COVID-19 situation, the Individual Consultant is not allowed to travel. Therefore, to reach Jakarta and other 5 (five) targeted areas of intervention, the project and the IC consultant will change the modernity of data collection, for instance, conducting the online survey and virtual interview.

The success of the project depends on the timely delivery of each component. The Consultant should ensure timely identification of potential risks and signal any delays in deliverables. The contract will be effective immediately upon signature by UNDP.

The Team of the PROTECT project at UNDP CO Indonesia will have the following responsibilities:

- (i) Provide relevant documents;
- (ii) Discuss and agree on the methodologies of the assignment;
- (iii) Monitor and evaluate the progress of the assignment.

The contract and payments will be performance-based and regularly assessed by the UNDP CO Indonesia. PROTECT project will not support the IC with facilities or supplies.

Duration of the Work

In accordance with the requirements above, the consultant is expected to work for a total of 50 days during 3 months from November 2020 – February 2021, in Jakarta and 5 other areas of interventions: Bandung, Bogor, Makassar, Malang, and Surakarta.

Duty Station

The consultancy will be managed by the PROTECT project at UNDP CO Indonesia. The consultant's presence is required both at the home-place and at the duty. In this regard, the IC is expected to work from home and in the workplaces for face-to-face meetings with the PROTECT Project team UNDP CO. In Indonesia, under the covid-19 pandemic situation, virtual meeting and any other possible communication channel will be utilized, while travel and face to face meeting is not allowed. There will be no official travel outside duty station.

Considering the pandemic situation, there will be no travel plan under this consultancy.
