Context of the Requirement	Nepal is considered one of the most progressive countries in South Asia and this has enabled Sexual Minorities to obtain citizenship under their preferred identity and passports under the "Other" category. Gender and Sexual Minorities (LGBTIQA+) people's rights as a fundamental human right was already recognized by a Supreme Court ruling in 2007. It legalized homosexuality and ensured right to protection of gender and sexual minorities. The Constitution of Nepal (2015) guarantees the rights of gender and sexual minorities to live a life free of stigma and discrimination including their right of access to public services. LGBTI community members experience stigma, discrimination and victimization across the course of their lives. The nature of the violence faced by lesbian women starts from family since it is where control is exerted over a woman's sexuality, mobility, and access to resources. The most common reality for LBT is that they are commonly targeted, harassed, and punished for their sexual orientation. So, there are still many legal constraints forbidding this section of the community to live dignified life. Therefore, the National Planning Commission is commencing a study on issues faced by the LGBTIQA+ community from a political, economic, social, and legal perspective.

I. INTRODUCTION

Nepal is considered one of the most progressive countries in South Asia and this has enabled Sexual Minorities to obtain citizenship under their preferred identity and passports under the "Other" category. Gender and Sexual Minorities (LGBTIQA+) people's rights as a fundamental human right was already recognized by a Supreme Court ruling in 2007. It legalized homosexuality and ensured right to protection of gender and sexual minorities.

The Constitution of Nepal (2015)¹² guarantees the rights of gender and sexual minorities to live a life free of stigma and discrimination including their right of access to public services. Article 12 states that citizens will be allowed to choose their preferred gender identity on their citizenship document. The choices available are male, female or other. ¹³ Gender and sexual minority are mentioned in article 18 (right to equality) and in article 42 (social justice) of the Constitution. The phrase 'gender identity' is mentioned in article 12 (citizenship ID) of the Constitution. Article 18 states that gender and sexual minorities will not be discriminated by the state and by the judiciary in the application of laws. It further adds that the government may

(Article 18) Right to equality:

- (1) All citizens shall be equal before the law. No person shall be denied the equal protection and benefit of the laws.
- (2) There shall be no discrimination in the application of general laws on grounds of religion, race, origin, caste, tribe, gender, sexual orientation, physical conditions, health conditions, physical impairment, matrimonial status, pregnancy, economic condition, language or geographical region, or ideology and such other matters.
- (3) The state shall not discriminate among citizens on grounds of religion, race, origin, caste, tribe, gender, sexual orientation, physical condition, physical impairment, health conditions, matrimonial status, pregnancy, economic condition, language or geographical region, ideology and such other matters. Provided that nothing shall be deemed to prevent the making of special provisions by law for the protection, empowerment or advancement of the poor, women lagging behind socially and culturally, Dalits, Adibasi (indigenous groups), ethnic groups, Khas Arya, Madhesi, Tharus, peasants, laborers, excluded groups, Muslims, backward classes, minority groups, marginalized groups, communities on the verge of extinction, youth, children, the elderly, gender and sexual minorities, people with physical impairment, physically incapacitated and the helpless, and the citizens of backward regions.

(Article 42) Right to social justice:

- (1) Socially backward women, Dalits, Adibasi, Janjati, Khas Arya, Madhesi, Tharu, minority groups, marginalized groups, Muslim, backward classes, gender and sexual minorities, youth, peasants, laborers, the oppressed and the citizens of backward regions, shall have the right to employment in state structures and public service on the basis of the principle of inclusion.

make special provisions through laws to protect, empower and advance the rights of gender and sexual minorities and other marginalized and minority groups. ¹⁴ Article 42 lists gender and sexual minorities among the groups that have a right to participate in state mechanisms and public services to promote inclusion. ¹⁵ Article 42 "Right to social justice" of the Constitution ensures the right to special opportunity and facilities in the areas of education, health, housing, employment, food and social security, for their protection, progress, empowerment and development.

LGBTI community members experience stigma, discrimination and victimization across the course of their lives. The nature of the violence faced by lesbian women starts from family since it is where control is exerted over a woman's sexuality, mobility, and access to resources. Women also faced economic constraints when they had to leave their homes and/or lose their jobs. Perhaps, because of the paucity in social acceptance, including family acceptance, inadequate knowledge on health issues, unfavorable environment in health institutions, and the lack of positive attitude of health service providers, very few members do visit hospital for any health issues. On the other hand, government does not have specific policy or strategy for LBT persons to provide easy access to the health centers.

However, it is often expressed by the gender and sexual minorities (LGBTIQA+) community that these rights enshrined in the Constitution and laws are yet to be implemented. Although the Hindu religion acknowledges the existence of many androgynous deities such as the 'Ardhanarishwara', prevailing attitudes and practices still discriminate against gender and sexual minorities (LGBTIQA+) people. This has resulted in the violation of human rights of gender and sexual minorities (LGBTIQA+) community thus depriving them to live a life of dignity in security and equality. On the other side, SDGs 1, 3, 4, 5, 10 and 16 directly address the issues of sexual and gender minority communities. Hence, it is believed that the government puts high priority for mainstreaming sexual and gender minorities' issues in planning and program for the achievement of SDGs by 2030.

II. RATIONALE OF THE STUDY

The issues of the LGBTIQA+ community are still not taken seriously in Nepal. The wrong perception of sexual orientation confined to the heterogeneous has created many issues for sexual minorities exploiting their human rights and dignity. The most common reality for LBT is that they are commonly targeted, harassed, and punished for their sexual orientation. These people are facing challenges with social acceptance and are victimized with human rights violations. Regarding problems in social acceptance, these community especially faces unfair treatment in the labor market. The lesser mobility of women in general, the issue of identity in achieving of higher education, the certain gender roles and the identity-based classical work division also create difficulties for them to enter into formal as well as informal economy. Decent wages, dignified labor and general respect is denied to greater extent. The issue of these types persons rights is discussed in the framework of The Universal Declaration of Human Rights, Adopted by UN General Assembly Resolution 217A(III) of 10 December 1948. The universal declaration of human rights (UDHR) which proclaims the "inherent dignity and the equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human family is the foundation of freedom, justice, and peace in the world." Nepal's constitution has also recognized LGBT community, and legally our country has decriminalized same-sex relationships and introducing new laws strengthening the community. However, there are still many legal constraints forbidding this section of the community to live dignified life. Further, the participation of these community

representatives at the mainstream politics and the decision-making role still negligible.¹⁶ Despite the notable advances on paper, the actual lives of the vast majority of LGBT people in Nepal is still challenging due to widespread poverty, rigid social norms, and an unsympathetic legal framework and bureaucracy (UNDP, 2014).

Therefore, the National Planning Commission is proposing to conduct a study on issues faced by the LGBTIQA+ community from a political, economic, social, and legal perspective. The study also aims to highlight the gaps in inclusion of gender and sexual minorities (LGBTIQA+) community in the policy arena and their absence in the policy- making process. The study will also provide evidence for policy-advocacy and policy-making/changes to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals by 2030 for ensuring no one is left behind.

III. OBJECTIVE OF THE ASSIGNMENT

The main objective of this study is to assess and document the political, economic, legal and social status of Gender and Sexual Minorities in Nepal. The specific objectives are to:

- Explore the political, social, economic and legal issues that exclude the gender and sexual minorities (LGBTIQA+) community in Nepal from the decision-making processes,
- Examine the existing patterns and trends of violence against gender and sexual minorities (LGBTIQA+) individuals,
- Identify the barriers and challenges faced by gender and sexual minorities (LGBTIQA+) individuals in accessing health, education, financial and other services,
- Analyze the gaps in the implementation of constitutional provisions made for the gender and sexual minorities (LGBTIQA+) community and make recommendations for the future interventions to address the gaps identified,
- Prepare the national level action plan to implementation the proposed recommendations.

IV. SCOPE OF WORK

The Consulting firm will use both quantitative and qualitative methods for the study. The data will be collected by using both primary and secondary sources. The Consulting firm will perform the following (but not limited to) activities during the course of assignment.

- i. Develop and submit the inception report with the detailed methodology, tools for collecting quantitative and qualitative data and information, structure/outline of study report including time-line and bibliography for the study in line with study objectives.
- ii. Desk review of all relevant international instruments, domestic policies and laws at the federal and provincial levels, studies and reports .
- iii. The survey will include at least 30 caseloads from each province on structured questionnaire (at least 210 caseloads in total), at least 3 FGDs outcome from each province and reasonable KIIs as a main source of information. However, the consulting firm will be responsible to propose the appropriate methodology while submitting the proposal and in the inception report if selected for the study.
- iv. The methodology should also clearly present the plan to include the caseloads and FGDs/KII representation of the urban-rural; mountains-hillsterai; all provinces; This is to ensure that the study is representative.

- v. Analyze the findings in detail and prepare the draft report with the identified issues and recommendations to address them (Part A). The report should also include a national level action plan with cost/budget estimation to address the key recommendation and findings. The action plan should clearly identify the actions in immediate term (within a year), medium term (1-2 year's term) and long term (more than 2 years' time). The action plan should be a separate section (Part B) in the main report. This draft version should be sent to NPC to get feedbacks and comments.
- vi. Present the revised draft report after incorporating the feedbacks received from the NPC, in the workshop to be organized by NPC for further discussion to take feedbacks from the stakeholders.
- vii. Finalize the report after incorporating all the comments/feedback received in the stakeholders' consultation meeting and submit it to the NPC.
