Section 2. Instruction to Bidders

A. GENERAL PROVIS	IONS
1. Introductio	 Bidders shall adhere to all the requirements of this RFP, including any amendments in writing by UNDP. This RFP is conducted in accordance with the UNDP Programme and Operations Policies and Procedures (POPP) on Contracts and Procurement which can be accessed at https://popp.undp.org/SitePages/POPPBSUnit.aspx?TermID=254a9f96-b883-476a-8ef8-e81f93a2b38d 1.2 Any Proposal submitted will be regarded as an offer by the Bidder and does not constitute or imply the acceptance of the Proposal by UNDP. UNDP is under no obligation to award a contract to any Bidder as a result of this RFP. 1.3 As part of the bid, it is desired that the Bidder registers at the United Nations Global Marketplace (UNGM) website (www.ungm.org). The Bidder may still submit a bid even if not registered with the UNGM. However, if the Bidder is selected for contract award, the Bidder must register on the UNGM prior to contract signature.
2. Fraud & Corruption, Gifts and Hospitality	 UNDP strictly enforces a policy of zero tolerance on proscribed practices, including fraud, corruption, collusion, unethical or unprofessional practices, and obstruction of UNDP vendors and requires all bidders/vendors observe the highest standard of ethics during the procurement process and contract implementation. 3. Eligibility	 3.1 A vendor should not be suspended, debarred, or otherwise identified as ineligible by any UN Organization or the World Bank Group or any other international Organization. Vendors are therefore required to disclose to UNDP whether they are subject to any sanction or temporary suspension imposed by these organizations. 3.2 It is the Bidder's responsibility to ensure that its employees, joint venture members, sub-contractors, service providers, suppliers and/or their employees meet the eligibility requirements as established by UNDP.
4. Conflict of Interests	 4.1 Bidders must strictly avoid conflicts with other assignments or their own interests, and act without consideration for future work. Bidders found to have a conflict of interest shall be disqualified. Without limitation on the generality of the above, Bidders, and any of their affiliates, shall be considered to have a conflict of interest with one or more parties in this solicitation process, if they: a) Are or have been associated in the past, with a firm or any of its affiliates which have been engaged by UNDP to provide services for the preparation of the design, specifications, Terms of Reference, cost analysis/estimation, and other

- documents to be used for the procurement of the goods and services in this selection process.
- b) Were involved in the preparation and/or design of the programme/project related to the services requested under this RFP; or
- Are found to be in conflict for any other reason, as may be established by, or at the discretion of UNDP.
- 4.2 In the event of any uncertainty in the interpretation of a potential conflict of interest, Bidders must disclose to UNDP, and seek UNDP's confirmation on whether or not such a conflict exists.
- 4.3 Similarly, the Bidders must disclose in their proposal their knowledge of the following:
 - a) If the owners, part-owners, officers, directors, controlling shareholders, of the bidding entity or key personnel are family members of UNDP staff involved in the procurement functions and/or the Government of the country or any Implementing Partner receiving services under this RFP; and
 - b) All other circumstances that could potentially lead to actual or perceived conflict of interest, collusion or unfair competition practices.

Failure to disclose such an information may result in the rejection of the proposal or proposals affected by the non-disclosure.

4.4 The eligibility of Bidders that are wholly or partly owned by the Government shall be subject to UNDP's further evaluation and review of various factors such as being registered, operated and managed as an independent business entity, the extent of Government ownership/share, receipt of subsidies, mandate and access to information in relation to this RFP, among others. Conditions that may lead to undue advantage against other Bidders may result in the eventual rejection of the Proposal.

B. PREPARATION OF PROPOSALS

- 5. General Considerations
- 5.1 In preparing the Proposal, the Bidder is expected to examine the RFP in detail. Material deficiencies in providing the information requested in the RFP may result in rejection of the Proposal.
- 5.2 The Bidder will not be permitted to take advantage of any errors or omissions in the RFP. Should such errors or omissions be discovered, the Bidder must notify the UNDP
- 6. Cost of Preparation of Proposal
- 6.1 The Bidder shall bear any, and all costs related to the preparation and/or submission of the Proposal, regardless of whether its Proposal was selected or not. UNDP shall not be responsible or liable for those costs, regardless of the conduct or outcome of the procurement process.
- 7. Language
- 7.1 The Proposal, as well as any and all related correspondence exchanged by the Bidder and UNDP, shall be written in the language (s) specified in the BDS.
- 8. Documents

- 8.1 The Proposal shall comprise of the following documents:

ns of the

9.1 The Bidder shall furnish documentary evidence of its status as an eligible and qualified vendor, using the Forms provided under Section 6 and providing documents required in those forms. In order to award a contract to a Bidder, its qualifications must be documented to UNDP's satisfaction.

10. Technical Proposal Format and Content	 The Bidder is required to submit a Technical Proposal using the Standard Forms and templates provided in Section 6 of the RFP. The Technical Proposal shall not include any price or financial information. A Technical Proposal containing material financial information may be declared non-responsive. Samples of items, when required as per Section 5, shall be provided within the time specified and unless otherwise specified by UNDP, and at no expense to UNDP When applicable and required as per Section 5, the Bidder shall describe the necessary training programme available for the maintenance and operation of the services and/or equipment offered as well as the cost to the UNDP. Unless otherwise specified, such training as well as training materials shall be provided in the language of the Bid as specified in the BDS.
11. Financial Proposals	 The Financial Proposal shall be prepared using the Standard Form provided in Section 6 of the RFP. It shall list all major cost components associated with the services, and the detailed breakdown of such costs. Any output and activities described in the Technical Proposal but not priced in the Financial Proposal, shall be assumed to be included in the prices of other activities or items, as well as in the final total price. Prices and other financial information must not be disclosed in any other place except in the financial proposal.
12. Proposal Security	 12.1 A Proposal Security, if required by BDS, shall be provided in the amount and form indicated in the BDS. The Proposal Security shall be valid up to thirty (30) days after the final date of validity of the Proposal. 12.2 The Proposal Security shall be included along with the Technical Proposal. If Proposal Security is required by the RFP but is not found along with the Technical Proposal, the Proposal shall be rejected. 12.3 If the Proposal Security amount or its validity period is found to be less than what is required by UNDP, UNDP shall reject the Proposal. 12.4 In the event an electronic submission is allowed in the BDS, Bidders shall include a copy of the Bid Security in their proposal and the original of the Proposal Security must be sent via courier or hand delivery as per the instructions in BDS. 12.5 The Proposal Security may be forfeited by UNDP, and the Proposal rejected, in the event of any one or combination, of the following conditions: a) If the Bidder withdraws its offer during the period of the Proposal Validity specified in the BDS, or; b) In the event that the successful Bidder fails: i. to sign the Contract after UNDP has issued an award; or 12.6 to furnish the Performance Security, insurances, or other documents that UNDP may require as a condition precedent to the effectivity of the contract that may be awarded to the Bidder.
13. Currencies	 All prices shall be quoted in the currency or currencies indicated in the BDS. Where Proposals are quoted in different currencies, for the purposes of comparison of all Proposals: a) UNDP will convert the currency quoted in the Proposal into the UNDP preferred currency, in accordance with the prevailing UN operational rate of exchange on the last day of submission of Proposals; and b) In the event that UNDP selects a proposal for award that is quoted in a currency different from the preferred currency in the BDS, UNDP shall reserve the right to award the contract in the currency of UNDP's preference, using the conversion method specified above.
14. Joint Venture,	14.1 If the Bidder is a group of legal entities that will form or have formed a Joint Venture (JV), Consortium or Association for the Proposal, they shall confirm in

Consortium or Association

their Proposal that: (i) they have designated one party to act as a lead entity, duly vested with authority to legally bind the members of the JV, Consortium or Association jointly and severally, which shall be evidenced by a duly notarized Agreement among the legal entities, and submitted with the Proposal; and (ii) if they are awarded the contract, the contract shall be entered into, by and between UNDP and the designated lead entity, who shall be acting for and on behalf of all the member entities comprising the joint venture.

- 14.2 After the Deadline for Submission of Proposal, the lead entity identified to represent the JV, Consortium or Association shall not be altered without the prior written consent of UNDP.
- 14.3 The lead entity and the member entities of the JV, Consortium or Association shall abide by the provisions of Clause 9 herein in respect of submitting only one proposal.
- 14.4 The description of the organization of the JV, Consortium or Association must clearly define the expected role of each of the entity in the joint venture in delivering the requirements of the RFP, both in the Proposal and the JV, Consortium or Association Agreement. All entities that comprise the JV, Consortium or Association shall be subject to the eligibility and qualification assessment by UNDP.
- 14.5 A JV, Consortium or Association in presenting its track record and experience should clearly differentiate between:
 - Those that were undertaken together by the JV, Consortium or Association;
 and
 - b) Those that were undertaken by the individual entities of the JV, Consortium or Association.
- 14.6 Previous contracts completed by individual experts working privately but who are permanently or were temporarily associated with any of the member firms cannot be claimed as the experience of the JV, Consortium or Association or those of its members, but should only be claimed by the individual experts themselves in their presentation of their individual credentials.
- 14.7 JV, Consortium or Associations are encouraged for high value, multi-sectoral requirements when the spectrum of expertise and resources required may not be available within one firm.

15. Only One Proposal

- 15.1 The Bidder (including the individual members of any Joint Venture) shall submit only one Proposal, either in its own name or as part of a Joint Venture.
- 15.2 Proposals submitted by two (2) or more Bidders shall all be rejected if they are found to have any of the following:
 - they have at least one controlling partner, director or shareholder in common;
 or
 - b) any one of them receive or have received any direct or indirect subsidy from the other/s; or
 - c) they have the same legal representative for purposes of this RFP; or
 - d) they have a relationship with each other, directly or through common third parties, that puts them in a position to have access to information about, or influence on the Proposal of, another Bidder regarding this RFP process.
 - e) they are subcontractors to each other's Proposal, or a subcontractor to one Proposal also submits another Proposal under its name as lead Bidder: or
 - f) some key personnel proposed to be in the team of one Bidder participates in more than one Proposal received for this RFP process. This condition relating to the personnel, does not apply to subcontractors being included in more than one Proposal.

16. Proposal Validity Period

16.1 Proposals shall remain valid for the period specified in the BDS, commencing on the Deadline for Submission of Proposals. A Proposal valid for a shorter period may be rejected by UNDP and rendered non-responsive.

	During the Proposal validity period, the Bidder shall maintain its original Proposal without any change, including the availability of the Key Personnel, the proposed rates and the total price.
17. Extension of Proposal Validity Period	 17.1 In exceptional circumstances, prior to the expiration of the proposal validity period, UNDP may request Bidders to extend the period of validity of their Proposals. The request and the responses shall be made in writing and shall be considered integral to the Proposal. 17.2 If the Bidder agrees to extend the validity of its Proposal, it shall be done without any change in the original Proposal. 17.3 The Bidder has the right to refuse to extend the validity of its Proposal, and in which case, such Proposal will not be further evaluated.
18. Clarification of Proposal	 Bidders may request clarifications on any of the RFP documents no later than the date indicated in the BDS. Any request for clarification must be sent in writing in the manner indicated in the BDS. If inquiries are sent other than specified channel, even if they are sent to a UNDP staff member, UNDP shall have no obligation to respond or confirm that the query was officially received. UNDP will provide the responses to clarifications through the method specified in the BDS. UNDP shall endeavor to provide responses to clarifications in an expeditious manner, but any delay in such response shall not cause an obligation on the part of UNDP to extend the submission date of the Proposals, unless UNDP deems that such an extension is justified and necessary.
19. Amendment of Proposals	 19.1 At any time prior to the deadline of Proposal submission, UNDP may for any reason, such as in response to a clarification requested by a Bidder, modify the RFP in the form of an amendment to the RFP. Amendments will be made available to all prospective bidders. 19.2 If the amendment is substantial, UNDP may extend the Deadline for submission of proposal to give the Bidders reasonable time to incorporate the amendment into their Proposals.
20. Alternative Proposals	 Unless otherwise specified in the BDS, alternative proposals shall not be considered. If submission of alternative proposal is allowed by BDS, a Bidder may submit an alternative proposal, but only if it also submits a proposal conforming to the RFP requirements. UNDP shall only consider the alternative proposal offered by the Bidder whose conforming proposal ranked the highest as per the specified evaluation method. Where the conditions for its acceptance are met, or justifications are clearly established, UNDP reserves the right to award a contract based on an alternative proposal. If multiple/alternative proposals are being submitted, they must be clearly marked as "Main Proposal" and "Alternative Proposal"
21. Pre-Bid Conference	When appropriate, a Bidder's conference will be conducted at the date, time and location specified in the BDS. All Bidders are encouraged to attend. Non-attendance, however, shall not result in disqualification of an interested Bidder. Minutes of the Bidder's conference will be disseminated on the procurement website and shared by email or on the e-Tendering platform as specified in the BDS. No verbal statement made during the conference shall modify the terms and conditions of the RFP, unless specifically incorporated in the Minutes of the Bidder's Conference or issued/posted as an amendment to RFP.
C. SUBMISSION AND	OPENING OF PROPOSALS

22. Submission 22.1 The Bidocum submis

- 22.1 The Bidder shall submit a duly signed and complete Proposal comprising the documents and forms in accordance with the requirements in the BDS. The submission shall be in the manner specified in the BDS.
- 22.2 The Proposal shall be signed by the Bidder or person(s) duly authorized to commit the Bidder. The authorization shall be communicated through a document evidencing such authorization issued by the legal representative of the bidding entity, or a Power of Attorney, accompanying the Proposal.
- 22.3 Bidders must be aware that the mere act of submission of a Proposal, in and of itself, implies that the Bidder fully accepts the UNDP General Contract Terms and Conditions.

Hard copy (manual) submission

- 22.4 Hard copy (manual) submission by courier or hand delivery allowed or specified in the BDS shall be governed as follows:
 - a) The signed Proposal shall be marked "Original", and its copies marked "Copy" as appropriate. The number of copies is indicated in the BDS. All copies shall be made from the signed original only. If there are discrepancies between the original and the copies, the original shall prevail.
 - b) The Technical Proposal and the Financial Proposal envelopes MUST BE COMPLETELY SEPARATE and each of them must be submitted sealed individually and clearly marked on the outside as either "TECHNICAL PROPOSAL" or "FINANCIAL PROPOSAL", as appropriate. Each envelope SHALL clearly indicate the name of the Bidder. The outer envelopes shall:
 - i. Bear the name and address of the bidder.
 - ii. Be addressed to UNDP as specified in the BDS
 - iii. Bear a warning that states "Not to be opened before the time and date for proposal opening" as specified in the BDS.

If the envelopes and packages with the Proposal are not sealed and marked as required, UNDP shall assume no responsibility for the misplacement, loss, or premature opening of the Proposal.

- 22.5 Email submission, if allowed or specified in the BDS, shall be governed as follows:
 - a) Electronic files that form part of the proposal must be in accordance with the format and requirements indicated in BDS.
 - b) The Technical Proposal and the Financial Proposal files MUST BE COMPLETELY SEPARATE. The financial proposal shall be encrypted with different passwords and clearly labelled. The files must be sent to the dedicated email address specified in the BDS.
 - c) The password for opening the Financial Proposal should be provided only upon request of UNDP. UNDP will request password only from bidders whose Technical Proposal has been found to be technically responsive. Failure to provide correct password may result in the proposal being rejected.
- 22.6 Electronic submission through eTendering, if allowed or specified in the BDS, shall be governed as follows:

23. Deadline for Submission of Proposals and Late Proposals	 23.1 Complete Proposals must be received by UNDP in the manner, and no later than the date and time, specified in the BDS. UNDP shall only recognize the date and time that the bid was received by UNDP 23.2 UNDP shall not consider any Proposal that is submitted after the deadline for the submission of Proposals. 	
24. Withdrawal, Substitution , and Modificatio n of Proposals	A Bidder may withdraw, substitute or modify its Proposal after it has been submitted at any time prior to the deadline for submission. Manual and Email submissions: A bidder may withdraw, substitute or modify its Proposal by sending a written notice to UNDP, duly signed by an authorized representative, and shall include a copy of the authorization (or a Power of Attorney). The corresponding substitution or modification of the Proposal, if any, must accompany the respective written notice. All notices must be submitted in the same manner as specified for submission of proposals, by clearly marking them as "WITHDRAWAL" "SUBSTITUTION," or "MODIFICATION" eTendering: A Bidder may withdraw, substitute or modify its Proposal by Canceling, Editing, and re-submitting the proposal directly in the system. It is the responsibility of the Bidder to properly follow the system instructions, duly edit and submit a substitution or modification of the Proposal as needed. Detailed instructions on how to cancel or modify a Proposal directly in the system are provided in Bidder User Guide and Instructional videos. Proposals requested to be withdrawn shall be returned unopened to the Bidders (only for manual submissions), except if the bid is withdrawn after the bid has been opened	
25. Proposal Opening	25.1 There is no public bid opening for RFPs. UNDP shall open the Proposals in the presence of an ad-hoc committee formed by UNDP, consisting of at least two (2) members. In the case of e-Tendering submission, bidders will receive an automatic notification once their proposal is opened.	
D. EVALUATION OF PR	ROPOSALS	
26. Confidential ity	 Information relating to the examination, evaluation, and comparison of Proposals, and the recommendation of contract award, shall not be disclosed to Bidders or any other persons not officially concerned with such process, even after publication of the contract award. Any effort by a Bidder or anyone on behalf of the Bidder to influence UNDP in the examination, evaluation and comparison of the Proposals or contract award decisions may, at UNDP's decision, result in the rejection of its Proposal and may be subject to the application of prevailing UNDP's vendor sanctions procedures. 	
27. Evaluation of Proposals	 27.1 The Bidder is not permitted to alter or modify its Proposal in any way after the proposal submission deadline except as permitted under Clause 24 of this RFP. UNDP will conduct the evaluation solely on the basis of the submitted Technical and Financial Proposals. 27.2 Evaluation of proposals is made of the following steps: a) Preliminary Examination b) Minimum Eligibility and Qualification (if pre-qualification is not done) c) Evaluation of Technical Proposals d) Evaluation of Financial Proposals 	

28. Preliminary Examination

28.1 UNDP shall examine the Proposals to determine whether they are complete with respect to minimum documentary requirements, whether the documents have been properly signed, and whether the Proposals are generally in order, among other indicators that may be used at this stage. UNDP reserves the right to reject any Proposal at this stage.

29. Evaluation of Eligibility and Qualificatio

- 29.1 Eligibility and Qualification of the Bidder will be evaluated against the Minimum Eligibility/Qualification requirements specified in the Section 4 (Evaluation Criteria).
- 29.2 In general terms, vendors that meet the following criteria may be considered qualified:
 - e) They are not included in the UN Security Council 1267/1989 Committee's list of terrorists and terrorist financiers, and in UNDP's ineligible vendors' list;
 - f) They have a good financial standing and have access to adequate financial resources to perform the contract and all existing commercial commitments,
 - g) They have the necessary similar experience, technical expertise, production capacity where applicable, quality certifications, quality assurance procedures and other resources applicable to the provision of the services required.
 - h) They are able to comply fully with UNDP General Terms and Conditions of Contract.
 - i) They do not have a consistent history of court/arbitral award decisions against the Bidder; and
 - j) They have a record of timely and satisfactory performance with their clients.

30. Evaluation of Technical and Financial Proposals

- 30.1 The evaluation team shall review and evaluate the Technical Proposals on the basis of their responsiveness to the Terms of Reference and other RFP documents, applying the evaluation criteria, sub-criteria, and point system specified in the Section 4 (Evaluation Criteria). A Proposal shall be rendered non-responsive at the technical evaluation stage if it fails to achieve the minimum technical score indicated in the BDS. When necessary and if stated in the BDS, UNDP may invite technically responsive bidders for a presentation related to their technical proposals. The conditions for the presentation shall be provided in the bid document where required.
- 30.2 In the second stage, only the Financial Proposals of those Bidders who achieve the minimum technical score will be opened for evaluation. The Financial Proposals corresponding to Technical Proposals that were rendered non-responsive shall remain unopened, and, in the case of manual submission, be returned to the Bidder unopened. For emailed Proposals and e-tendering submissions, UNDP will not request for the password of the Financial Proposals of bidders whose Technical Proposal were found not responsive.
- 30.3 The evaluation method that applies for this RFP shall be as indicated in the BDS, which may be either of two (2) possible methods, as follows: (a) the lowest priced method which selects the lowest evaluated financial proposal of the technically responsive Bidders; or (b) the combined scoring method which will be based on a combination of the technical and financial score.

1.0: Overview

The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) is the UN's global development network, advocating for change and connecting countries to knowledge, experience, and resources to help people build a better life. UNDP in partnership with the private sector, development partners, civil society and academia is supporting the Government of the Republic of Uganda (Government) to achieve sustainable development outcomes, create opportunities for empowerment, protect the environment, minimize natural and man-made disasters, build strategic partnerships, and improve the quality of life for all citizens.

UNDP Uganda with support from the Government of the Republic of South Korea and working in partnership with the District Local Governments of Adjumani, Obongi and Lamwo is implementing the Uganda Host and Refugee Community Empowerment Project' that started 2019 and will be concluding in 2023. This is an area-based, gender-responsive emergency livelihoods and economic recovery project, implemented using the UNDP 3X6 model. The overall objective of this project is to improve the economic livelihoods of Refugees and Host communities with an emphasis on women and youth in refugee-hosting communities. Two major inter-related outcomes are expected: (i) Socio-economic gender equality in the context of livelihood improved, (ii) Enhanced capacities for mainstreaming gender equity and Gender Based Violence (GBV) prevention among key sub-national government agencies, communities, livelihood actors, and private sector. The project aims to directly support 7,200 individual beneficiaries and over 36,000 people indirectly. Uganda Host and Refugee Community Empowerment (UHRCEP) Project conducted a farm and nonfarm value chain assessment in 2021. The assessment was aimed at building a clear understanding of constraints that prevent Refugees and Host community members from exploiting opportunities along the value chains of selected commodities. The assessment also aimed to provide a mapping of possible interventions that can be undertaken to build the capacity of the target communities, to exploit economic opportunities for improved livelihoods and to provide strategic recommendations for UNDP in upgrading the selected value chains.

The value chain study identified three agricultural value chains for upgrade (Cassava, Sesame, and sunflower) in the three districts. The study recommended the production and aggregation value chain nodes as the key entry points for value chain upgrading because they provide the turning points for the value chain functionality and a greater multiplier effect across the value chains. It

emphasized innovations that focus on the improved coordination of production, technological upgrading to improve harvest and post-harvest management on one hand.

2.0: Rationale for the assignment:

The refugee and host communities in Adjumani, Lamwo and Obongi practice subsistence farming despite having vast land that supports agriculture in northern Uganda. Access to land is a major challenge among refugees. Besides access to land, both refugees and host communities are constrained by challenges in accessing inputs, labor to manage larger acreage and markets for their produce. One of the key factors responsible for this situation is the lack of organization and coordination mechanism among the refugees and host communities to harness the existing social capital in order to increase access to land for farming for refugees and vulnerable groups like women and youth. There is need to coordinate production and procurement of inputs to attract credible suppliers, create economies of scale and reduce input acquisition transaction costs and consolidate their farm produce by bulking for collective marketing, negotiate premium prices, reduce transaction costs and increase the profitability of their farm enterprises. The lack of organization and market orientation at the production level where refugees and host community farmers are active and the absence of an organized farmer-based intermediary organization like a cooperative is responsible for the dysfunctional and exclusionary behavior of the agro-value chains.

The informality in the production and consolidation segments of the value chains has affected the ability of smallholder farmers to exploit the vast market opportunities along with the farm and non-farm value chains.

The above opportunities have been created by several economic recovery programs implemented by UNDP, Government, and several non-government organizations in refugee-hosting areas. Key among these include the cash for work support, agricultural input distribution and vouchers. In addition to these, several value chain, agricultural sector as well as entrepreneurship development programs have been implemented by the government, humanitarian, and development Non-Government Organizations (NGOs). These and others underscore the need to address the transformation of the selected value chain participation of smallholder refugee and host community farmers from informal to formal business engagements as a strategy to upgrade the selected primary (sesame and cassava) value chains and the secondary (grain/flour milling and Bakery & restaurant) micro-enterprise value chains. The recommendation to promote sunflower in Obongi as a complimentary value chain to sesame and cassava is because the current crushing capacity of 1.2Metric tones per hour cannot support a rapid increase in supply and when operated at full capacity may pose a challenge to stock build-up of finished product in the absence of a clear and competitive marketing and distribution strategy. Sunflower and sesame oils are premium oils that are afforded by the upscale and more competitive market.

3.0: Key constraints identified in the value chains:

Cassava, Sesame and Sunflower production are viable value chains with potential to improve livelihood of refugees and host communities in Uganda but has been affected by the following constraints:

- a) Low level of investment and technical support for the value chains.
- b) Limited financing and investment in smallholder farm business enterprises due to limited access to Credit for production.
- c) Limited farm business and entrepreneurial knowledge and skills needed to increase productivity, manage profitable farm enterprise, and start and grow micro-enterprises.
- d) Poor organization and lack of coordinated collective action to achieve market economies of scale as a pre-requisite for smallholder farmer competitiveness and market/value chain inclusion.
- e) Limited access to quality seed and other inputs
- f) Pests and diseases affecting crop production
- g) Lack of technical knowledge and skills in commercial production of cassava, sesame, and sunflower.
- h) Market is not well organized in terms of information dissemination and linkages of producers to processors or exporters.

4.0: Purpose of the Value Chain Upgrade

The proposed value chain upgrading for the sesame, cassava and sunflower value chains is expected to be implemented over a period 16 months and will focus on two turning points of each of the three, farm-based value chains identified during the Market Assessment study, that is to say;

- 1. The production segment,
- 2. The consolidation segment,

The overall objective of the upgrade is to attract investments at all levels of the value chain needed to increase value chain competitiveness and inclusiveness. The value chain upgrade seeks to achieve the following objectives and contribute to project outcome 1.0 (Socio-economic gender equality in the context of livelihood improved) and output 1.1 (Strengthened economic capacities of women in refugees and host communities through livelihood opportunities). The first level intervention will be to mobilize farmers for production and organize them into formal producer groups to include them in the formal economy and build their capacity to engage in formal trading engagements.

The objective is to;

- 1. To increase the inclusion and participation of women, youth and refugees in the sesame, cassava, and sunflower (for Obongi) value chains to improve household incomes.
- 2. To build the capacity of the Multi-purpose Cooperative in each of the three districts to perform the role of an intermediary trading organization linking up production and the market to increase member incomes and profitability of their farm enterprises.
- To organize a multi-stakeholder platform involving all the key value chain actors to address challenges, opportunities, and value chain bottlenecks within the value chain development process.
- 4. To build the capacity of the multi-purpose cooperative to coordinate production, facilitate collective marketing and build forward market linkages and contracting, and act as a center for value addition, entrepreneurship development and business inclusion for the members.
- 5. To address key cross-cutting issues which include mindset change to prepare the beneficiaries for the transition from the humanitarian and subsistence mindset to an agribusiness and market-oriented mindset.

5.0: Call for proposals

UNDP is making available funds for 18 months to contribute towards addressing some of the constraints and strengthen the functioning of the Cassava, Sesame and Sunflower value chains so that their potential can be realized. The agency seeks to engage a firm with the objective of upgrading these value chains in the three districts (Adjumani, Lamwo and Obongi) working with refugees and host communities by carrying out the following activities:

5.1: Key Activities

- a) Develop group selection criteria for active farmers ready to produce.
- b) Mobilize the beneficiaries of the project to access land to produce at least 1 acre each of sesame, Sunflower, and cassava each year.
- c) Train the groups on group dynamics, leadership, and financial literacy.
- d) Mobilize and organize the project beneficiaries into producer groups of 30-40 members and support them to register as producer cooperative societies under the Cooperative Societies (Amendment) Act, 2020.
- e) Support Producer associations develop constitutions and register at the subcounty and district (District Commercial Officer) levels as primary cooperative societies.
- f) Provide the farmers with quality inputs in terms of seeds, rhizobia, and stock of the necessary and environmentally friendly agro-chemicals to protect the crop from pests and diseases.
- g) Provide extension services to the farmer to produce Cassava, Sesame and Sunflower following good agronomic practices.
- h) Facilitate the farmers to access financial education and business development services to better manage their financial resources and link the farmers to financial institutions to access finance for production or other needs
- i) Facilitate the capacity development of the farmer groups or associations into cooperative societies to be able to better serve their members.
- j) Facilitate market linkages between farmers and off-taker of Cassava, Sesame and Sunflower.

- k) Support farmer groups to increase the quantity of cassava, Sesame and sunflower produced and required by bulk buyers in Obongi district through block farming (i.e. production and productivity enhancement)
- 1) Engage private players (both farm and off farm business ventures) through multi-stakeholder innovative platform to link farmers to buyers and bind them through MoU or contracts
- m) Develop a robust market information system to inform traders and farmers on product quantities and commodity prices in project locations.
- n) Organize and support the farmer-producer cooperative societies into a Multi-purpose Cooperative in accordance with the Cooperative Societies (Amendment) Act, 2020.
- o) To coordinate and facilitate the farmer households working through the producer group societies to access quality and affordable inputs, mobilize savings and access credit for production and organize bulking of the farmers group to promote collective marketing.
- p) Agricultural extension services and production planning for the members working through the farmer producer group cooperative societies
- q) Set up demonstration gardens for learning purposes under the selected value chains.
- r) Identification of private sector actor for contract farming within the selected value chain to stimulate production amongst producer associations
- s) Mobilize resources and capital for investment in building and expanding the cooperatives business model to achieve market competitiveness, business sustainability and operate as a profitable business going concern responding to the economic and social welfare of the members.
- t) Conduct exposure/learning visits of Primary cooperative societies executives to already existing Cooperative for exposure and knowledge sharing to stimulate growth within formed Primary Cooperative Societies.
- u) Promotion of market research by Producer association committees (Market committee, Finance committee and production committee through digital inclusion.
- v) Develop the monitoring and evaluation framework for the intervention.

5.2 Key Deliverables

- 1) At least 10 farmer groups formed in each of the focus sub counties and 2 cooperative societies in the selected districts.
- 2) Developed guidelines, training materials and handouts for the value chain upgrade.
- 3) Operational farmer groups and cooperative societies in the districts of focus.
- 4) A developed and functioning monitoring and evaluation framework for the interventions.
- 5) Developed robust market information system to inform traders and farmers on product quantities and commodity prices in project locations.
- 6) Monthly, quarterly and end of intervention reports.

6.0: Geographical Location

The value chains upgrade will be conducted in the three refugee hosting districts of Adjumani, and Obongi of Uganda.

7.0: Supervision/Reporting line

To achieve the envisaged objectives, the service provider will work under the overall supervision of the Project Manager Uganda Host and refugee community empowerment project and the team leader Governance and Peace UNDP. The contractor will receive guidance from other UNDP specialty units and relevant Government Ministries/Departments as deemed necessary.
