I. BACKGROUND

a) Briefly describe the project rationale / background and the objectives of the project

In recent years, Indonesia has experienced the decline of number, scale, and success of extremist attacks. However, the rise of ISIS has brought with it new complexity and transnational element to violent extremism in Indonesia. The blast around *Thamrin street* in the early 2016 and the bus terminal bombing in 2017 have shown that the radical activity inspired in part by ISIS. The previous ones that occurred in Surabaya, 2018, have transformed the patterns of the violent act in the violent extremism by involving women and children, acting as perpetrators of the attack. Also, another attack in Makassar and Jakarta in March 2021, where the role of women already totally changes, from supporters, to become perpetrators.

In response to that situation, many actors have been actively engaged to prevent violent extremism. Those factors include the government of Indonesia, CSOs, academics, and religious-based mass organizations, and UN Agencies. They have been involved in the development of the policymaking including, in the areas of law enforcement and community-based approach that aimed to reduce the risk of violent-extremism leading to terrorism.

Based on the Secretary-General's Plan of Action to Prevent Violent Extremism and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 16: Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions, the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) and the European Union has launched the project "Preventing Violent Extremism through Promoting Tolerance and Respect for Diversity" (PROTECT) on August 2018, aiming to reduce the risk of violent extremism in the region by taking a preventive and welfare approach with core respect to human rights, and gender mainstreaming in South-East Asia. The PROTECT project is a regional project, which is being implemented in four countries of South-East Asia: Thailand, Philippines, Malaysia, and Indonesia.

Building on these achievements and lessons learned of the 1st phase, the 2nd phase of PROTECT project is making the same 3 (three) pillars of interventions; support the government policy on NAP on PCVE both at the national and sub-national level, data, and analysis, and strengthening the capacity of PCVE actors, such as religious-based organizations, youth, children, and women through various pieces of training to promote tolerance, pluralism, and respect for diversity among groups in the communities. All of intervention is gendersensitive.

The PROTECT Project has taking the leading role in facilitating a series of policy engagement on the NAP on PCVE with various stakeholders by implementing "the whole of government" and "whole of society approach.

Since the first phase of the PROTECT Project, the project had been providing extensive support to accelerate the issuance of the NAP on PCVE through several activities. As a result, in December 2019, BNPT successfully submitted the final draft of the Presidential Regulation regarding the NAP on PCVE to the Ministry of Laws and Human Rights for further process of its issuance, and in 6 January 2021, the President of the Republic of Indonesia officially signed the Presidential Regulation No. 7 of 2021 concerning the National Action Plan on Preventing and Countering Violent Extremism that Leads to Terrorism.

b) Briefly describe the context of the required services

The efforts of the Indonesian government in handling and overcoming extremism, radicalism, and terrorism can be tracked by the policies and programs that have been carried out. The most recent and remarkable milestone is the issuance of Presidential Regulation number 7 of 2021 regarding the National Action Plan for Preventing and Countering Violence Extremism that Leads to Terrorism. The issuance of Presidential Regulation is one step forward and a form of commitment by the Indonesian government in minimizing the potential for the spreading of terrorism that arises from the extreme thoughts, attitudes, and actions that develop in the midst of society.

The stipulation of regulation in the form of a Presidential Regulation No. 7 of 2021 concerning the National Action Plan for Preventing and Countering Violence Extremism that Leads to Terrorism (NAP on PCVE) is expected to strengthen several other government policies and become a reference for all parties, particularly local governments throughout Indonesia to make efforts to prevent the potential for extremism that thrives in Indonesia through integrated concrete actions, and strengthen coordination between government agencies and multi stakeholders in preventing violent extremism on Indonesian soil.

After the enactment of Presidential Regulation No. 7 of 2021 regarding PCVE, UNDP through PROTECT project has provided continuous support to government counterparts in implementing NAP on PCVE. After reaching the first half NAP on PCVE implementation period, UNDP was requested by BNPT for evaluating the result of implementation the Presidential Regulation No 7 of 2021, utilizing the evaluation tool stipulated on the Chief

of BNPT's Regulation No. 5 of 2021 on the Mechanism for Coordination, Monitoring, Evaluation, and Reporting of the Implementation of NAP on PCVE (PERBAN No 5 of 2021).

c) Emphasize the relevance/purpose of the work required and how it is linked to the project context

The PROTECT project plans to have several activities with the consultant to provide support to government counterparts in evaluating of NAP on PCVE through various activities:

- 1. Conduct FGD on development of methodology of Mid-term Evaluation with BNPT
- 2. Conduct Mid-term evaluation of implementation of NAP on PCVE based on evaluation's indicators indicated on PERBAN No 5 of 2021 Annex I.
- 3. Dissemination of the substance of Mid-term Evaluation's report on implementation of NAP on PCVE to the broader to relevant stakeholders.

Through these activities, the main objective of the consultant is to develop methodology for Mid-term evaluation which is in line to indicators on PERBAN No 5 of 2021 Annex I and collect data through a series of FGDs with relevant stakeholders to assess the progress and analyse the extent of achieving of the implementation of the NAP on PCVE and disseminate findings with key stakeholders. The Consultant will work closely with the government in facilitating the evaluation regarding the implementation of NAP on PCVE.

d) List and describe the stakeholders for the project.

The Midterm Evaluation of NAP on PCVE will be implemented for and with direct participation and in close partnership with:

- The national government, such as the Coordinating Ministry for Human Development and Cultural Affairs (Kemenko PMK), the Coordinating Ministry for Political, Legal and Security Affairs (Kemenko Polhukam), the National Counter-Terrorism Agency (BNPT), the Ministry of National Development Planning (BAPPENAS), the Ministry of Home Affairs (Kemendagri), the Ministry of Religious Affairs (Kemenag), the Ministry of Education and Culture Affairs (Kemendikbudristek), the Ministry of Women Empowerment and Child Protection (KPPPA), and the Indonesian Witness and Victim Protection Agency (LPSK)
- 2. Local-level governments of Bogor, Bandung, Malang, Surakarta, and Makassar, and
- 3. Civil Society Organizations (CSOs).
- 4. Academia
- 5. Practitioners/Activists.
- e) If applicable, explain thoroughly the peculiarity of the setting of the project or the work required, if any (e.g., security risks involved in conducting the work in certain communities, certain cultures and practices unique to the stakeholders, etc.)

The main issue of evaluating the implementation activities after the enactment of presidential regulation number 7 of 2021 is the unavailability of baseline data. The interpretation on the evaluation's indicator might vary between stakeholders engage in the implementation of NAP on PCVE.

To mitigate the issue, the Consultant will facilitate the close communication and consultation with the government counterparts, relevant authorities, and other related stakeholders to engage government in evaluating the implementation of NAP on PCVE.

Scope of Work

Under the direct supervision of the National Project Manager of PROTECT project, the Consultant will work closely with Mr Abdul Charis, the National Consultant to Strengthen the Implementation of NAP on PCVE and the key government agencies, such as the Joint Secretariat of NAP on PCVE of BNPT, Key Government Stakeholders, CSOs, development partners, and other relevant parties.

The Consultant will be responsible for the following tasks:

- 1. Conduct kick-off meeting with government authorities on the midterm evaluation of the progress implementation of the NAP on PCVE.
- 2. Design and prepare an evaluation concept/methodology in assessing the progress of implementation of NAP on PCVE at both national and sub-national levels.
- 3. During the evaluation process of NAP on PCVE, facilitate the workshop, Focus Group Discussion (FGD), in depth interview to collect data for mid-term evaluation, and coordination meeting with the government counterparts at the sub-national level regarding the midterm evaluation of NAP on PCVE.
- 4. Incorporate feedback from stakeholders in the final mid-term evaluation report
- Disseminate findings and lessons learn from Mid-term Evaluation's report on implementation of NAP on PCVE to the broader to relevant stakeholders.

Expected Outputs and deliverables

The expected outputs from the activities are:

- 1. Methodology for mid-term evaluation developed through consultation with government counterparts.
- 2. The Final midterm evaluation report of the progress of implementation the NAP on PCVE, agreed by stakeholders.

The consultant is expected to work in close consultation with project consultants and related Institutions in succeeding in the exercise of conducting the midterm evaluation as well as CSOs to secure the evaluation result NAP on PCVE will be adopted and used for improving the implementation in the remaining period of implementation of NAP on PCVE.

The success of the project depends on the timely delivery of each component. The Consultant should ensure the timely identification of potential risks and signal any delays in deliverables. The contract will be effective immediately upon signature by UNDP.
