In submitting your Proposal by email, kindly ensure that they are signed and in the .pdf format, and free from any virus or corrupted files.

The Technical Proposal and Financial Proposal files MUST BE COMPLETELY SEPARATE and sent separately and clearly marked as either "TECHNICAL PROPOSAL" or "FINANCIAL PROPOSAL," as appropriate. Each document shall include the Proposer's name and address.

Services proposed shall be reviewed and evaluated based on completeness and compliance of the Proposal and responsiveness with the requirements of the RFP and all other annexes providing details of UNCDF requirements.

The Proposal that complies with all of the requirements, meets all the evaluation criteria and offers the best value for money shall be selected and awarded the contract. Any offer that does not meet the requirements shall be rejected.

Any discrepancy between the unit price and the total price shall be re-computed by UNCDF, and the unit price shall prevail and the total price shall be corrected. If the Service Provider does not accept the final price based on UNCDF's re-computation and correction of errors, its Proposal will be rejected.

#### 1. Project Background and Description

Music is increasingly recognized as a transformative power, not only as a cultural staple but also as a social and economic driver for cities. However, many local music artists in cities, are faced with a lack of affordable access to creative spaces such as music studios, because many are unemployed; and the inadequate building capability within arts and cultural institutions. Evidence also suggests that local music artists, consistently receive inadequate compensation, credit, and recognition for original works. UNCDF aims to partner with cities in Africa, to build public will for equity and inclusion. The heightened importance of local music artists and in elevating their status, is based on the premise of the far-reaching benefits of the creative sector and the need to make music and culture part of citizens daily lives, as well as building a flourishing creative economy. This includes a growing fund for the arts as well as promoting its economic, social, cultural, and environmental value and supporting professional development opportunities.

UNCDF will utilize its inclusive investment model developed as part of the IncluCity project to finance economic and cultural infrastructure in target cities in Africa. With strong partnerships with the city mayors and municipalities, IncluCity will provide a comprehensive approach to mayors and city planners through technical assistance, capacity building, new tools, and direct financing to deploy innovative solutions to address growing economic exclusions by focusing on the creative and cultural infrastructure.

The Project envisages establishing an incubator of local and emerging talents and creative entrepreneurs, aiming to strengthen the capacities and increase job opportunities in the music industry, especially targeting youth, women, and people from disadvantaged groups; The Project will strengthen the music ecosystem (SDG 8: Economic Growth; SDG 9: Industry Innovation and Infrastructure; SDG 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities) by stimulating infrastructure investments such as markets with added performance spaces, cultural labs and recording studios) in the sector and city through recording projects; and set up a Music Development Hub and/or an international educational platform based on a network of residences and students.

IncluCity includes a plan to directly design, build and finance 10 IncluCity hubs in at least 6 countries over 4 years. The IncluCity model also includes accelerate the scaling up of these hubs through third party institutions and financiers in other cities not directly supported by IncluCity investment in a hub.

IncluCity hubs comprise, inter alia, the following elements.

- Transport facilities (bus station, rail station, etc.)
- Retail facilities specifically oriented to local business with accessible rental terms.
- Food and produce market facilities specifically oriented to local producers and sellers with accessible rental terms.
- Schools, Health centers and other social infrastructure
- Housing specifically oriented to local residents on accessible terms.
- Light industry and agricultural processing units
- Orange economy facilities (film and recording studio, performance space, etc.)

The total construction cost of IncluCity hubs will range between \$0.5m and \$5m. IncluCity hubs will be designed on a demand driven and city friendly basis. Whilst central government approval is necessary, IncluCity hubs are developed with the objective of boosting local government capacity, local fiscal space, and the local economy. As such, IncluCity hubs will be directly connected to locally led plans and initiatives.

The Orange Economy advisor will provide advice and support to UNCDF and its clients in the implementation of the orange economy element within the IncluCity hubs. This will include, inter alia:

- Support to IncluCity project manager in selection of hubs and countries according to criteria to be defined IncluCity project

# 3. Scope of Work

Output for each IncluCity hub is indicated below:

- 1.1. **Conduct consultations:** With the Local Municipalities of each target country, via a focal point assigned by the cities to identify internal and external stakeholders for input on feasibility study and to get feedback from the cities on key areas of importance to them for this engagement.
- 1.2. **Feasibility study and presentation of milestones:** The feasibility study must cover the following components:
  - a. Site Selection and Technical analysis: Review legal and regulatory framework enabling local governments jurisdiction over the orange economy facilities and IncluCity hubs.
     Establish locational suitability, propriety of the proposed size, according to the criteria to be defined by the IncluCity project.
  - b. Capacity Building and Advisory for developing country Local Governments: Structure and present training courses on the orange economy to a variety of local government counterparts and their implementing agencies in aspects related to public procurement; service delivery; regulation of public and private space; and facilitating enterprise support and incentives.
  - c. **Mobilizing Private Investment and Catalyzing Partnerships:** Mobilize savings from potential financiers and African American diaspora, promoting investment in the OE hubs, which will enhance income and skills especially for youth, women and minorities in secondary cities and rural areas.
  - d. **Retrofit OE facilities within IncluCity hubs:** Integrate orange economy products, leading to the design and layout of the orange economy facilities within each hub. Integration of the outputs from the orange economy facilities within the local and global creative economies. Replication and scale up of the OE model to other countries and municipalities.

# 5. Institutional Arrangement

The service provider will work under the overall guidance from the IncluCity Programme Manager, and Director of the UN Subnational Finance Hub based in New York. The service provider will interact regularly with the beneficiaries and with the other relevant partners identified during the inception phase of this assignment. The Director of Planning is the key focal person for the Local Municipalities in Morocco, Senegal, Uganda, Rwanda, Tanzania, and Seychelles, during the implementation. The Local Municipalities in the target countries across Africa, will provide office space on its premises during the engagement period.

#### 6. Duration of the Work
